Pursuant to House Resolution 1367,  
Chairman Kelly and Ranking Member Crow have  
requested this interview as part of the Task  
Force investigation.

## EXAMINATION

BY

Q Can you please state your name and  
spell your name for the record.

A Sure. My name is  
.

Q Thank you,

My name is and I am  
Special Counsel and a consultant with the Task  
Force. I want to thank you for coming in today

1 for this interview. The task Force recognizes and  
2 appreciates that you are here voluntarily.

3 You are allowed to have an attorney  
4 present to advise you during the interview.

5 Do you have an attorney representing  
6 you?

7 A I do.

8 [REDACTED] Would counsel please  
9 identify himself for the record.

10 [REDACTED]: Yes. For the record, my  
11 name is [REDACTED]. Last name spelled  
12 [REDACTED].

13 BY [REDACTED]

14 Q And he is the only attorney  
15 representing you today?

16 A Yes.

17 Q For the record, members of Congress are  
18 permitted to come in and observe and ask questions  
19 as they see fit. There are none present here  
20 today. We don't know if someone will come in, but  
21 if someone does. We will introduce that member to  
22 you and that person would be able to observe and  
23 then also ask questions.

24 A Okay. Uh-huh.

25 Q Now, you've introduced yourself to me.

1 My colleague here is [REDACTED]. He's also with  
2 the Majority. And then I would ask the Minority  
3 to introduce themselves.

4 [REDACTED]: Good afternoon, sir.

5 [REDACTED], Investigative Counsel for the Task  
6 Force Minority.

7 [REDACTED]: Hi. [REDACTED]

8 [REDACTED] Investigative Counsel for the Task  
9 Force Minority.

10 [REDACTED] Okay.

11 BY [REDACTED]

12 Q [REDACTED] before we begin I would  
13 like to go over the ground rules of the interview.

14 A Uh-huh.

15 Q The way this interview will proceed is  
16 as follows: The Majority and Minority staff will  
17 alternate asking you questions, 30 minutes per  
18 side, per round until each side is finished with  
19 their questioning. The Majority staff will begin  
20 and proceed for 30 minutes and then the Minority  
21 staff will have 30 minutes to ask questions.

22 We will then alternate back and forth  
23 in this manner until both sides have no more  
24 questions. If either side is in the middle of a  
25 specific line of questions, they may choose to end

1 a few minutes past an hour -- a half an hour to  
2 ensure completion of that specific line of  
3 questioning including any pertinent follow-ups.

4 In this interview while one member of  
5 the staff for each side may lead the questioning,  
6 additional staff may ask questions.

7 There is a court report taking down  
8 everything that we say and everything that you say  
9 to make a written record of this interview. For  
10 the record to be clear, please wait until the  
11 staffer questioning you finishes each question  
12 before you answer your question -- the question.  
13 And the staffer will wait until you finish your  
14 response before proceeding to the next question.

15 Further, to ensure the court reporter  
16 can properly record this interview, please speak  
17 clearly, concisely and slowly. Also, the court  
18 reporter cannot record nonverbal answers, such as  
19 nodding or shaking your head, so it's important  
20 that you answer each question with an audible  
21 verbal answer.

22 Do you understand?

23 A Yes.

24 Q We want you to answer our questions in  
25 the most complete and truthful manner possible, so

we will take our time. If you have questions or do not fully understand the question, please let us know we will attempt to clarify, add context to or rephrase our questions.

Do you understand?

A Yes.

Q If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you are unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of those conversations or events to the best of your recollection.

If you recall only a part of the conversation or event, you should give us your best recollection of those events or parts of the conversations that you do recall.

Do you understand?

A Yes.

Q Although you were here voluntarily and we will not swear you in, you are required, pursuant to 18 U.S.C. Section 1001, to answer questions from Congress truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by Congressional staff in an interview or consultants like myself.

Do you understand?

A Yes.

1           Q     If at any time you knowingly make false  
2 statements, you could be subject to criminal  
3 prosecution.

4                     Do you understand that?

5           A     Yes, I do.

6           Q     Is there any reason you are unable to  
7 provide truthful testimony in today's interview?

8           A     No.

9           Q     Please note that if you wish to assert  
10 a privilege over any statement today, that  
11 assertion must comply with the rules of the Task  
12 Force on the attempted assassination of Donald J.  
13 Trump.

14                     For the Chair to consider assertions of  
15 privilege over testimony or statements, witnesses  
16 must clearly state the specific privilege being  
17 asserted and the reason for the assertion on or  
18 before the scheduled date of testimony or  
19 appearance.

20                     In this case you have your counsel  
21 present, so presumably he would make any such  
22 assertions on your behalf.

23           A     Okay.

24           Q     And given that your counsel is present,  
25 as well, if at any time during the questioning you

1 would like to speak to him off the record and  
2 outside our presence, you are free to make that  
3 request and we will allow you to do that.

4 A Okay.

5 Q Do you understand all that?

6 A Yes. Thank you.

7 Q Finally, I would like to note that the  
8 content of what we discuss today is confidential.  
9 We ask that you not speak about what we discussed  
10 here today in this interview to any outside  
11 individual in order to preserve the integrity of  
12 this investigation.

13 For these same reasons, the marked  
14 exhibits used today will be provided to the court  
15 reporter so that they may go into the full  
16 official transcript. Any copies of those exhibits  
17 will be returned to us when we wrap up.

18 We plan to take five-minute breaks or  
19 so at the end of each 30 minutes of questioning.  
20 But that's open to how you feel and how everyone  
21 else feels so we can go longer or take breaks  
22 during questioning.

23 But if you need to take a longer break  
24 or you need to take a break during questioning, we  
25 would ask that you answer any pending question

1 before you take the break and then you can --  
2 we'll return to the questioning once you've taken  
3 the break.

4 Do you understand?

5 A Yes.

6 Q Okay. Do you have any questions before  
7 we begin?

8 A Nope.

9 Q I'm going to now set my timer to keep  
10 me somewhat honest and then we will start the  
11 questioning.

12 First, can you just tell us again -- or  
13 tell us for the first time, what exactly is your  
14 title in your current position?

15 A I work for Prospect Borough Police  
16 Department as a police officer, and my title with  
17 the team is sniper team leader.

18 Q Do you have any other responsibilities?

19 A We start as operators, so I'm still a  
20 base operator for them. So if they don't need  
21 snipers -- we do that primarily. But if they need  
22 a sniper element, then I'm in charge of whatever  
23 we need for sniper stuff.

24 Q Okay. And can you -- I'm sorry. Are  
25 you primarily a sniper?

1 A Yes.

2 Q Okay. And how long have you been in  
3 that role?

4 A Since 2019.

5 Q And that's your full-time job?

6 A No. No.

7 Q Tell us what your other --

8 A My full-time job is a [REDACTED]

9 [REDACTED]

10 Q [REDACTED]

11 A And I do part-time police work as a  
12 police officer. And then ESU, the Emergency  
13 Services Unit, is an additional voluntary  
14 part-time gig, basically.

15 Q Okay.

16 A So it's like a third job almost.

17 Q Right. Third job.

18 And what [REDACTED] are you --

19 A Butler County.

20 Q [REDACTED]. Okay.

21 And so how would you describe the split  
22 between your time that you spend at ESU versus the

23 [REDACTED]

24 A [REDACTED] is full-time, so it's definitely  
25 40 hours a week. ESU is, aside from activations

1 or call-outs, it's 16 hours a month of training.  
2 8 -- or 4 hours of that, roughly, is sniper  
3 training so...

4 Q And who is your boss at ESU?

5 A [REDACTED] is our commander.

6 Q Do you report to anybody else at ESU?

7 A Any of the other commanders: [REDACTED]

8 [REDACTED] or [REDACTED].

9 Q And do you have direct reports to you  
10 at ESU?

11 A I have two snipers that are full -- I  
12 don't want to call them full-time snipers.  
13 They're snipers that are assigned strictly to a  
14 sniper squad like myself, which would be [REDACTED]  
15 [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. And then the rest of them  
16 are primarily operators under another team leader.  
17 But they're assigned to me to use, as well, if I  
18 need them.

19 Q Okay. And why is it -- why is it that  
20 split between you and the other...

21 A Just for lack of personnel. So they  
22 try to keep our operator side of our staffing  
23 higher because we do more operator stuff for  
24 warrants and stuff like that.

25 So we generally need them more for that

1 type of an operation. And occasionally they will  
2 put a sniper in the turret for overwatch or if we  
3 have another building or something we can use for  
4 overwatch on the house, if we're going to use for  
5 a warrant, and our primary job is literally to  
6 just overwatch the scene of the incident.

7 But if they don't need more than one  
8 sniper, then everybody else goes to the operator  
9 side of it.

10 Q Okay. And we've heard a little bit  
11 about "operator." Can you describe what that  
12 means to you.

13 A The operator is a person that is  
14 trained with basic SWAT tactics, breaching doors,  
15 tactical room entry, flash-bangs, room-clearing  
16 things, like high-risk warrant service stuff.

17 Q Right.

18 A So they're the guys that are basically  
19 the door-kickers that go in and go through the  
20 house and make the arrest and stuff.

21 Q And then if you're -- if somebody is  
22 assigned to be the sniper, that's not part of  
23 their responsibility?

24 A Correct.

25 Q What do you call that responsibility?

1 A That would be overwatch.

2 Q Overwatch.

3 A Right.

4 Q And your principal responsibility is  
5 overwatch?

6 A Usually, yes.

7 Q Usually?

8 A There's been times -- I have a  
9 background in fire service, so forcible entries is  
10 kind of one of the things I do, too.

11 So if they have another sniper there  
12 that's not as prevalent in forcible entry, they  
13 may put them into the turret to do overwatch and  
14 put me on as a breacher then, a breacher position.

15 So it just depends on who we have  
16 available for that call as to where we get plugged  
17 in to. They try to put the best pick per spot to  
18 make it go smoothly.

19 Q Got it. Okay.

20 Are there are, roughly, what? 45  
21 people or so in the ESU for Butler County?

22 A Roughly, yeah. If you count the  
23 TEMS -- the Tactical EMS and the snipers and the  
24 negotiators and just the assistants and stuff,  
25 yeah.

1           Q     So are there, between yourself and the  
2     two people who directly report to you normally,  
3     there are three, I'll call them full-time snipers?  
4     I know they're not full-time.

5           A     Right.

6           Q     But for purpose of ESU, that's their  
7     principal role?

8           A     Right.

9           Q     So the three of you are the -- that  
10    would be the principals -- that's your principal  
11    role is to be the snipers, and that's the group?

12          A     Correct.

13          Q     Okay. Can you tell just a little bit  
14    about your training to be a sniper. Just the -- I  
15    don't need a lot of details.

16                 Just, like, when you first started  
17    training with being a sniper and just the course  
18    of that.

19          A     Yeah, I started in January of 2019.  
20    That's when they asked me to become a sniper on  
21    the team. And I started training with them once a  
22    month for roughly four hours a month, sometimes a  
23    little bit more, sometimes a little bit less,  
24    depending on the training day.

25                 And then in -- because of COVID 2021 I

1       went to the National Tactical Officer Association  
2       Basic SWAT Sniper One Class. So, and that was  
3       roughly a 44-hour week because they had to make  
4       some time for some night shooting and stuff.

5               But it was a week, basically, on sniper  
6       tactics for police snipers.

7               Q     Understood.

8               And before 2019 did you have any  
9       experience as a sniper?

10              A     No.

11              Q     As we understand it, ESU is basically a  
12       group of, usually, law enforcement people who  
13       essentially apply to be part of the ESU; is that  
14       right?

15              A     Correct.

16              Q     So it's -- obviously you apply for your  
17       jobs but it's sort of an additional job on top of  
18       your permanent job; is that right?

19              A     Correct. We put in an application to  
20       be on the team.

21              Q     Okay.

22              A     Sometimes they come to us and ask us to  
23       join the team and sometimes it's just guys that  
24       hear by word of mouth to get on the team and they  
25       put an application in and then they do an

1 interview process.

2 Q Understood. Did you -- did they seek  
3 you out or did you seek them out?

4 A I was asked by a friend of mine. [REDACTED]  
5 [REDACTED] and I have known each other for like 30  
6 years. And he came to me and asked me when I was  
7 going to get on the team so...

8 Q And you were interested in doing that?

9 A Yes.

10 Q And you went through the process of  
11 applying and being interviewed and you were  
12 accepted to ESU?

13 A Correct.

14 Q When you first started at ESU were you  
15 in, call it the supervisory role, or were you  
16 reporting to somebody who is in the position you  
17 have now?

18 A When I first got on the team I was just  
19 as an operator so I had a -- my team leader at the  
20 time or my squad leader was actually [REDACTED]  
21 before he moved up to a command position.

22 Q Got it.

23 A And then after that year that's -- at  
24 the end of that year is when I got asked to go to  
25 the sniper squad. I was still was on [REDACTED]

1 [REDACTED] squad as an operator because I wasn't a  
2 full-time sniper unit at that point.

3 Then the sniper team leader asked me to  
4 be his assistant, which is [REDACTED]. And he  
5 had some stuff going on so he had to drop out of  
6 the team and I stepped into that role then.

7 Q And that was what year?

8 A That would have been 20- -- I want to  
9 say '22. Around the beginning of '22, like  
10 March-ish.

11 Q Okay. And so since then you've been in  
12 the position you're in?

13 A Correct. Correct.

14 Q Now, I understand, of course, that  
15 there are -- that ESU deals principally with  
16 operations that involve executing search warrants,  
17 things like that.

18 How often have you dealt with events  
19 like what we're going to talk about on July 13th,  
20 where, you know, it's a set event and you're  
21 providing security for the event?

22 A This was the first one.

23 Q Okay. And so you were not involved in  
24 the 2020 rally that then President Trump had in  
25 Butler County?

1 A I was as an operator.

2 Q As an operator?

3 A Because they didn't need snipers. They  
4 didn't request our snipers. They had us as an  
5 outside-of-the-event area team for [REDACTED] purposes if  
6 something did kick off.

7 Q Right. And just for the record, can  
8 you say what [REDACTED] is?

9 A [REDACTED].

10 Q Right. Okay.

11 Occasionally I'm going to ask you  
12 questions that are obvious answers but I need it  
13 for the record.

14 A Right. Yeah. I apologize.

15 Q No. No. Not at all.

16 If you use -- it's my job and everyone  
17 else's job on this side and that side to make sure  
18 that the record is clear. It's not your job.  
19 Okay. All right.

20 So this is the first event you had  
21 been a -- an event that was a set event where  
22 you're providing security as a sniper?

23 A Correct.

24 Q When you said that there -- that  
25 snipers had not been requested in 2020, do you

1 mean that snipers from Butler County from ESU were  
2 not requested?

3 A Correct. Butler County ESU snipers  
4 were not requested. I believe they used a  
5 different agency at that time, different law  
6 enforcement agency.

7 Q Okay. All right. And you're -- well,  
8 actually, you know what? Let's keep this rolling.  
9 I'm going to go to July -- not the day itself  
10 but...

11 A Right.

12 Q So when did you first become aware of  
13 the July 13th event? I don't need exact dates and  
14 times, just generally.

15 If you remember the exact date, great.  
16 If you don't, that's fine.

17 A I don't remember the exact date. It  
18 was that Tuesday day before the event.

19 Q Okay.

20 A Was the first I heard that they asked  
21 for sniper assistance.

22 Q And who told you about that?

23 A It was brought up. We had a training  
24 that night and we had a brief meeting on it. And  
25 it was [REDACTED] was the one that mentioned

1       it.

2               Q       And what was [REDACTED] role?

3               A       He's the Bravo squad team leader. And  
4 he was kind of the point man for most of the setup  
5 on this or the game planning.

6               Q       And what is Bravo squad?

7               A       We have two quads of operators: Alpha  
8 Squad and Bravo Squad. They just divide them into  
9 two squads. So they have two team leaders, two  
10 assistant team leaders and then operators  
11 underneath each one of them.

12              Q       And is there a reason that one group is  
13 Alpha Squad and the other is Bravo Squad?

14              A       More for logistical purposes if you're  
15 searching -- or serving a search warrant or arrest  
16 warrant we can, say, "Hey, Alpha Squad is going to  
17 take care of this assignment and Bravo Squad is  
18 going to take care of this assignment."

19              Q       Okay. It's just logistical?

20              A       Just for designation.

21              Q       For designation?

22              A       Yes.

23              Q       And [REDACTED] was the head of Bravo  
24 Squad at that time?

25              A       I believe so, yes. I always get

1 [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] mixed up on which squad  
2 they control now because I'm not involved with  
3 them so...

4 Q Okay. Understood.

5 Had you received any kind of -- do you  
6 recall receiving any kind of text message from  
7 Commander [REDACTED] prior to that about the event  
8 coming up and that there might be a need for ESU  
9 support?

10 A There was -- yeah, there was a text  
11 message sent out, I want to say, around July 5th  
12 that said that former President Trump was coming  
13 to Butler to do a rally there and that ESU is  
14 requested to assist with the event.

15 Q Okay.

16 A But even at that time nobody on the  
17 team, to my knowledge, had any knowledge of sniper  
18 request. It was just operational purposes, so for  
19 operators.

20 Q Were you aware -- you said that you  
21 found out on the Tuesday before the event, which I  
22 think would put it on July 9th?

23 A I believe it was the 9th, yeah.

24 Q So the day before were you aware that  
25 there was an initial meeting between Secret

Service and ESU and others, other nonfederal law enforcement to discuss what the Secret Service's needs would be for that event?

A I found out Tuesday night that they had had a meeting. But I wasn't -- being as up until that point, I wasn't involved as a team leader, so they were kind of keeping most of that into the command staff side of it.

Q Okay. Now, when you learned about that there was going to be a need for snipers on July 9th, just generally speaking, what were you informed of?

A Just that they had requested our snipers for overwatch is what I was told.

Q And how many snipers did they need, from your understanding?

A They didn't specify how many they wanted. We told them what we had as far as how many snipers we have available with the team. And we didn't know how many we were going to have officially until closer to that date.

We knew I would be there. I was making arrangements with my full-time job to make it to that day. And then it all depended on the individual snipers and their home departments what

1 they could do, whether they could help out or not.

2 Q And that included [REDACTED]

3 A Correct.

4 Q And then, I'm sorry. Who was the other  
5 person? I just blanked on the name.

6 A [REDACTED]

7 Q [REDACTED]

8 A [REDACTED], yes.

9 Q Were they present when you learned of  
10 the need for the request for snipers from Butler  
11 ESU?

12 A [REDACTED] was, yes.

13 Q And did you -- did [REDACTED] indicate  
14 that he would be available at that point or  
15 sometime thereafter?

16 A He didn't know if he would be available  
17 to assist but we all still try do to what we can  
18 to help out through -- even if it's -- even if we  
19 can't participate specifically with that event we  
20 still try to help out with coordinating everything  
21 together so that it tries to run smoothly.

22 Q And did you all, you or [REDACTED]  
23 contact [REDACTED] or to see if he would be  
24 available?

25 A No. It went out there text message, I

believe, or an e-mail or something from Commander [REDACTED] eventually said, "Hey, we need snipers and we need to know who is available for" -- actually, I believe it was a -- I retract that.

It was an alert through our active alert system that we have for our team. They put out who's available for this event. And then everybody that's on the team is in that alert. So they based it off of what any snipers in that group put that they were available.

Q Okay. And just again, so I'm clear, there were three, as we call it, "full-time" -- putting air quotes around it for the record.

A Right.

Q -- snipers. That was you, [REDACTED] And I don't know about [REDACTED]

So your understanding was that the request was, whatever you can spare, please have these folks available.

A Correct. It was basically supply what you can. And then I didn't know after that if they were going to -- like, how many they requested specifically, if any.

However, if there was a set number that they needed to meet their requirements for the

1 event -- I do know that later on the commanders  
2 reached out to Beaver County ESU and Washington  
3 Regional Squad and requested a couple snipers for  
4 each of them to help fill some void with that.

5 Q Okay. So that was done -- the request  
6 to Beaver and to Washington was done by the  
7 commanders?

8 A Correct. And that was a couple days  
9 later, I believe.

10 Q Okay. So, and you knew -- or did you  
11 know at the time -- so, well, actually you already  
12 testified to this. You had to check with the  
13 prison to make sure that you would be available to  
14 do the event on the 13th?

15 A Correct.

16 Q And you did and they said you would be  
17 available?

18 A Correct. I ended up using a vacation  
19 day because I was scheduled to work midnight that  
20 night. And I didn't want to work the night and  
21 try to get out there because we wanted to be in  
22 our position by 11 a.m. So I would have been  
23 working until 6. And I had high probability of  
24 getting forced over until lunchtime.

25 So I didn't want to go out after

1 lunchtime with no sleep to try to -- because I had  
2 short-shifted into the midnight is what was going  
3 to happen. So I had worked daylight Friday and  
4 then I was coming back out at 10:00 that night  
5 so...

6 Q Okay. So when you first learned about  
7 the request for snipers on the July 9th, did  
8 [REDACTED] or anyone else that, you know, that  
9 you learned about this from, express any views  
10 about what they learned from the Secret Service in  
11 terms of whether or not they thought the plan was  
12 something that could be done by Butler ESU?

13 A No. It was just everybody was kind of  
14 scrambling trying to get everything in order to  
15 see what we had, what we needed and what we didn't  
16 have as to supplies so we can reach out to other  
17 agencies to assist with that.

18 Q Got it.

19 Did you have an understanding at that  
20 point, on July 9th, whether or not the Secret  
21 Service was intending to say -- intending to  
22 direct where the snipers would be located from  
23 Butler ESU or just simply saying we need snipers  
24 for this event?

25 A I was told that they just asked for

snipers. They didn't specify the job detail or the locations or anything.

Q So was it your understanding at that point that it would be up to Butler ESU to determine what the best positioning was based on the overall plan?

A Correct.

Q Were you responsible for putting the plan together for the sniper aspect of the Butler ESU response?

A It was a combination of myself and [REDACTED]

Q Okay. And how would you say -- did you work collaboratively or did each of you have a particular aspect that you were responsible for?

A We worked collaboratively. We had met -- any chance that we both were off at the same time we would try to meet up and go over some stuff and figure out what our best plan was.

Q Okay. And so how did you go about doing that? Did you visit the site? What did you do to --

A That night that we found out that we were requested, [REDACTED] knew somebody from AGR or something, so he contacted them to see if we

could look at their site as a possible position to use. We didn't know if we were going to be able to use it or not.

The only thing we knew at that time was roughly where they were going to set the event up at inside of the Farm Show grounds.

So we were trying to look at different places that we could utilize or get access to to see what gave us a very good vantage point of that area.

Q So when you found out where the stage would roughly be, did you receive a map or some kind of overview from anyone to lay it out for you?

A No. It was by word of mouth at that meeting that night. They said basically -- they pulled up, like, a Google Maps overview and they said what they were told or what they were presented with at their meeting with the Secret Service was this was going to be here and then they kind of went over some real rough ideas of how the layout was going to be.

Q Okay. Were you familiar with -- enough with the site area that you could -- you understood basically what they were talking about

1 just based on an oral conversation?

2 A Yes.

3 Q Okay. And [REDACTED] your impression  
4 was that he was also familiar enough with it?

5 A Yes.

6 Q Had you guys ever done any kind of  
7 security events at that site before?

8 A No.

9 Q But you visited it or were familiar  
10 with it?

11 A Correct. They have the Farm Show there  
12 every year so we go as a family so...

13 Q And you mentioned AGR. AGR was  
14 obviously adjacent to the site. Why in particular  
15 was AGR something that you guys focused on?

16 A What they requested us was as snipers,  
17 our main purpose as police snipers, is overwatch.  
18 They didn't specify that they wanted  
19 counter-sniper actions to be taken, they didn't  
20 specify if they wanted overwatch actions being  
21 taken.

22 So our automatic assumption was it's  
23 overwatch. That's what we do. And then they  
24 informed us later on they were going to have  
25 countersnipers so we figured, okay, cool. That's

1 covered. Both entities are covered.

2 So as overwatch we are generally  
3 outside of the event, we're on the outside  
4 perimeters of the event looking in.

5 Q Right.

6 A So we looked at the event site and it  
7 was where they were going to place the stage and  
8 where they wanted the crowd to come in to, was  
9 going to be on the very edge of the site. And we  
10 knew that inside the Farm Show grounds there was  
11 plenty of places to pick from to put up overwatch  
12 but we didn't have anything really on the outside  
13 that we knew of that we could get access to so...  
14 Because a lot of it outside of that, obviously, is  
15 private property and we have to have permission to  
16 do so. We can't just go in and commandeer  
17 somebody's building.

18 Q Right.

19 A Or anything like that.

20 Q Okay. And so AGR is that [REDACTED]  
21 had a contact at AGR?

22 A Correct.

23 Q So he contacted that person?

24 A Correct. And asked if we would be able  
25 to just take a look at the site to see if it would

1 be functional for us.

2 Q And that person said yes?

3 A Yes. And we meet that night at AGR  
4 right before it started getting dark. So we were  
5 able to see a good bit of what we would be able to  
6 see. And we kind of started working at that point  
7 of, like, where do we want to set our guys up at?  
8 Or where do we want to try to set our guys up at?

9 Because, obviously, the day of an event  
10 things change, because you don't know if -- in  
11 fact, the day before I drove past the event area  
12 on my way to do something else and I noticed a  
13 bunch of tents and I was like, "Oh, wow. I didn't  
14 know they were going to put tents up. Does that  
15 change our view? Does that change what we're  
16 going to be able to see as overwatch?"

17 So it's always a position that's freely  
18 able to adjust to whatever the needs are to  
19 perform their duties.

20 Q Got it. And was it your view that AGR  
21 was going to be outside the perimeter of the  
22 event? That's right? Right?

23 A Correct. It's outside the perimeter.

24 Q So AGR itself was not something that  
25 was being thought of as something that needed

1 overwatch?

2 A Let me see if you're saying this. So  
3 you're asking if I felt that it didn't need to be  
4 watched from a different position?

5 Q From behind or whatever, right?

6 In other words, if you're placing -- if  
7 it's a potential place to set up to do overwatch,  
8 that would then, itself, be subject to overwatch?

9 A With my experience of only doing  
10 overwatch in the dignitary protection, no  
11 counter-sniper stuff, it was, that gave us the  
12 closest building with high ground to be able to  
13 see into the event area. And to kind of watch  
14 along the fence line to make sure nobody was doing  
15 anything weird there.

16 Q From your perspective overwatch is  
17 looking in?

18 A Correct.

19 Q But you understood there were  
20 counter-snipers provided by whomever, the Secret  
21 Service, whomever that would be looking out?

22 A Correct.

23 Q So it was your understanding that the  
24 overwatch, call it, of the AGR Building would be  
25 coming from inside the perimeter looking out?

1           A       If they felt that building was a threat  
2 of any kind, then that would be something that a  
3 counter-sniper would, more or less, watch or have  
4 eyes on. Or if anybody felt that was a position  
5 of advantage for somebody else to use as it  
6 happened, then we would have thought somebody  
7 would say, "We need eyes on that building." Not  
8 just inside that building. Or on top looking into  
9 the event.

10                   So looking back knowing the difference  
11 between the overwatch and counter-sniper, if they  
12 would have said we want counter-sniper coverage  
13 and were very clear about that, then, yes, we  
14 wouldn't have been posted up where we were on  
15 that. We would have had a different position on  
16 that.

17                   Actually, the positions we did end up  
18 picking we selected because they overlapped  
19 everybody's views. So my position in the  
20 announcer's booth at the grandstand, I could see  
21 the majority of the roofs at AGR, but they were  
22 380 yards away. So it's one of those, I wasn't  
23 watching the roof because I was watching the  
24 crowd. And we were watching people act really  
25 strange in the crowd doing some stuff, so we were

1       trying to keep an eye on them.

2               The countersnipers were set up on the  
3       roofs behind the stage and they had a 180-degree  
4       view. They had nothing to block their view. And  
5       it covered from AGR the whole way across our  
6       command center on their left. So they had a  
7       pretty good view of everything around them.

8               The Washington County Snipers were  
9       underneath me in the bleachers in the northern  
10      corner of the bleachers and had a different  
11      perspective but they had a view from behind that  
12      we couldn't see from our position that covered the  
13      entranceway of the event, and Route 68, the  
14      tractor sales, that kind of stuff. So we kind of  
15      all had a view of that.

16              I hate to rely on terminology, but  
17      overwatch, when it's told to me we were providing  
18      overwatch, it changes my game plan on how I'm  
19      going to do something.

20              Q       Right.

21              You understood your job was overwatch,  
22      which we've heard other people say you're a  
23      sniper?

24              A       Right.

25              Q       That's very different than

1 counter-sniper?

2 A Correct. Correct. And overwatch for  
3 us from what we understood was we were to watch  
4 the event crowd to make sure that there was no  
5 incidents, if anybody started getting actively  
6 violent or acting strange in a manner that might  
7 make us say, "Hey, something is up with that  
8 person. We need to investigate that a little bit  
9 more."

10 We could relay that information to our  
11 command post. They could relay it to whoever they  
12 needed to that what was uniform that day that  
13 could go out and make contact with them.

14 Q Right. Just from, like, a very, like,  
15 simplistic way, a counter-sniper is literally  
16 trying to counter potentially another sniper?

17 A A counter-sniper is inside the event  
18 looking outside of the event. They're not  
19 watching the crowd inside the event. That's not  
20 their concern.

21 Q Right.

22 A Because their security should have  
23 vetted them enough that they shouldn't be a  
24 concern.

25 So a counter-sniper is watching

1 everything around the event that they feel is  
2 potential for a dangerous situation or for  
3 somebody to take advantage of a high building or a  
4 higher position to be able to take a shot at  
5 somebody.

6 Q Right. Understood.

7 Let me -- so, when you were looking at  
8 AGR Building as a potential -- on the July 9th  
9 evening, as a potential area to use for your  
10 overwatch, did you contemplate that that was also  
11 a building that you would have to itself monitor  
12 and sweep and secure?

13 A When we looked at the building that  
14 night, that Tuesday night, we looked at the aspect  
15 from what our jobs were and we said before we  
16 could do this we need to make sure somebody knows  
17 there needs to be security over here of some kind.

18 So [REDACTED] -- I wasn't able to  
19 attend the next meeting that took place. I  
20 believe it was Thursday morning. I wasn't able to  
21 attend because of my job. He was off. He  
22 attended it and he stressed that to the Secret  
23 Service. And said, "Hey, we were looking at this  
24 as a site. But we can't cover the ground. We  
25 can't cover all that with what we're doing as our

[REDACTED]

1 duties. We don't have a staff through ESU to  
2 cover that ground."

3 So somebody needs to be in there,  
4 whether it was a uniformed officer, somebody.  
5 Somebody needed to be walking around that  
6 perimeter of that building and keeping people out  
7 of there.

8 Because the owner stressed to us at the  
9 time he met with us, "Hey, we don't want people  
10 congregating on our property because we don't want  
11 property damage. We don't want any incidents."  
12 So we want them to be kept off the property  
13 completely.

14 Q So your understanding was that  
15 [REDACTED] was informing Secret Service or other  
16 law enforcement that that building has to be  
17 secured by, not itself, by somebody else? At  
18 least the perimeter of that building has to be  
19 secured?

20 A Correct, because with the limitation of  
21 how many snipers we were going to have there was  
22 no way we could provide overwatch and security at  
23 that building.

24 Q Understood.

25 And then just going back to the night

1 of July 9th, did you tour the grounds generally or  
2 did you focus on the AGR Building?

3 A We just focused on the AGR building  
4 that night because it was starting to get dark.  
5 And then we went back out Thursday afternoon to  
6 tour it ourselves and just walk around to get some  
7 ideas of where we wanted to be. It might have  
8 been Wednesday night. Wednesday or Thursday  
9 night. I can't remember now, off the top of my  
10 head.

11 Q You mentioned that there was a briefing  
12 or meeting on June 11th, which was a Thursday?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And that you were not able to attend?

15 A Correct.

16 Q Did you learn subsequently that that  
17 was -- or before that that was going to be a  
18 walk-through?

19 A I didn't know what the purpose of the  
20 meeting was.

21 Q Okay.

22 A It sounded like the -- from what I got  
23 on the 9th at our team gathering that the planning  
24 of it was very fluid at that time. It was still  
25 kind of -- lots of things were up in the air, what

1 they were going to do. There was no set, distinct  
2 positions yet of everybody.

3 So it was still kind of, like, being  
4 changed around and pieces were still being moved  
5 around to make it work.

6 So at that time my assumption was that  
7 they were going to try to finalize some of that  
8 stuff but I didn't know exactly what they were  
9 going to focus on or that they were going to go  
10 out to the site and actually walk around it.

11 Q Okay. Understood.

12 We've had some people tell us about  
13 some of the initial planning that you weren't  
14 directly involved in. But that there was a  
15 message from the Secret Service from the beginning  
16 of the planning that, at least within optical view  
17 of the candidate on the stage, that there was a  
18 desire not to have an obvious show of force behind  
19 him.

20 Was that something that was conveyed to  
21 you?

22 A It was mentioned but it wasn't conveyed  
23 directly to me because it was just -- it didn't  
24 involve my position and what my duties were.

25 Q Right.

1           A       It involved more of the counterassault  
2       team. Operators that are going to be assigned to  
3       the counterassault team and the operators that  
4       were going to be assigned to the [REDACTED] position that  
5       was positioned behind the barn area of the stage.

6           Q       Just a couple more questions and I will  
7       hand it over to Minority.

8                   Was it conveyed to you that they did  
9       not want the snipers to be visible?

10          A       No. They never said where they wanted  
11       our snipers, if they wanted us out in the open or  
12       not. We had a small event, we'll call it. It was  
13       a parade on July 4th in Zelienople and they expect  
14       usually around 8,000 people. It's a very large  
15       parade.

16                   So for the first time ever their police  
17       chief requested just a couple of our snipers to  
18       position up on the rooftops just with a set of  
19       binoculars basically just to kind of watch the  
20       crowd to make sure nothing breaks out and if there  
21       was any incidents, just report it to uniform guys.

22                   So I told [REDACTED] and another guy  
23       were up there, and I told them, don't wear your  
24       normal fatigues. Just wear a khaki shirt and put  
25       your badge where they can see it. And they still

1 got complaints that somebody is up on the roof and  
2 there are people up there and they were all  
3 concerned about it. And every uniformed officer  
4 was getting notified of that.

5 So our job, as sniper, is not always to  
6 be out in the open. We do a lot of hides. We do  
7 building hides, vehicle hides, natural hides, that  
8 kind of stuff. Because if we're detected, we  
9 can't always do our job properly.

10 So our natural starting point was,  
11 let's start with building hides, and get out of  
12 sight so that we're not attracting more  
13 unnecessary attention, so that the uniformed  
14 officers can focus on what they're supposed to be  
15 doing inside the event.

16 Q Understood. But for this particular  
17 event you are not giving instructions, one way or  
18 the other, about whether or not they expected you  
19 to be hiding?

20 A Correct.

21 Q That was something that was going to be  
22 left to your discretion?

23 A Correct.

24 [REDACTED] I'm going turn you over to  
25 the Minority.

\_\_\_\_\_

We can go off the record for a minute.

(Brief recess.)

## EXAMINATION

BY [REDACTED] :

Q Thank you, [REDACTED] I have just a

I believe you said it was July 9th when

A That was -- what was relayed to me was

Q So was that July 8th meeting, your

1 providing overwatch sniper support for the  
2 July 13th event?

3 A I don't know what day they met with  
4 them. I just know it was -- because we met at  
5 6:00 that night, so it was sometime after 6:00  
6 that I was notified.

7 Q Who would have been from Butler ESU the  
8 main point of contact for Secret Service?

9 A I don't know who was actually in  
10 contact with them directly. I do know that  
11 Commander [REDACTED] was in contact with them at some  
12 point.

13 I also know that [REDACTED] was in  
14 contact with them, too. So I don't know  
15 specifically which one had which contact at what  
16 times and dates and stuff.

17 Q Understood.

18 We've talked a bit about the difference  
19 between snipers and counter-snipers. What was  
20 your understanding of who would be providing  
21 counter-sniper support?

22 A My understanding was because they  
23 provided counter-snipers that that was their job  
24 to do counter-sniper work.

25 Q Meaning Secret Service?

1           A     Correct.

2           Q     And when did you come to understand  
3     that there would be Secret Service providing  
4     counter-sniper support?

5           A     I found that out, I want to say, it was  
6     the next day maybe, that they were going to  
7     provide that.

8           Q     But in advance of the July 13th event?

9           A     Just a few days, yes.

10          Q     And my understanding is that from what  
11     you were saying there was a request for Butler ESU  
12     to provide the sniper support but Secret Service  
13     did not give any instruction as to particular  
14     positions, particular points of overwatch for you  
15     all?

16          A     Correct. They just asked for us. That  
17     was it.

18          Q     And then you identified AGR as a  
19     potential point given that it was a slightly  
20     higher point of reference to be able to look into  
21     the crowd, into the event?

22          A     Correct. It was the closest building  
23     with a high enough angle that we could see the  
24     event crowd.

25          Q     Within AGR, how did you determine where

1 the position would be?

2 A We got a rough idea of where we wanted  
3 them, between myself and [REDACTED] We kind of  
4 looked around there. There was a lot of  
5 cubicle-style setting, some offices, some  
6 cubicles. And the windows weren't very big. They  
7 were, I believe, 21 inches roughly.

8 So we were looking at -- we just needed  
9 to be able to see the crowd. And we wanted to  
10 make sure that they were going to have somebody  
11 there to watch the grounds, so that wasn't our  
12 concern of the grassy area in between the building  
13 and the fence.

14 It was what can we see of inside the  
15 event and from what position is the best.

16 Q And from within AGR did you ever  
17 consider your walk-through, whether somebody might  
18 be on the roof of that building?

19 A To put one of our snipers on the roof?

20 Q Yes.

21 A We didn't discuss that and mainly  
22 because it falls back to our training of being  
23 inside where we're not seen and we wanted to stay  
24 out of the publicity of it. We also knew that  
25 we -- that they wanted us to be in our positions

roughly at 11 a.m. and we didn't know what the weather was going to like at that point in time.

We knew that we would need multiple ladders to be able to get up to the highest point of that, to be able to get all our equipment and stuff up there. So it was -- to us it was more secure for us to be inside because we could have a swipe card key to get in. That door would be locked. We wouldn't have to worry about anybody coming up behind our guys unannounced or anything.

Q Understood.

If I could ask you to take a look at what we can call Minority Exhibit A, I think if we're using letters.

(Minority Exhibit A was marked for identification.)

Q Do you recognize this image?

A I do, yes.

Q What are we looking at here?

A This is a map from our mapping agency in the county that we had drawn up -- this actually is a map I did -- of distances from positions that we ended up picking for our sniper positions.

Q And about --

1                   Please, go ahead.

2                   A     It just -- the color coding is just  
3 strictly to show the overlap and what sniper  
4 element was going to be able to cover what most.

5                   Q     Do you recall about when you created  
6 this?

7                   A     It would have been Wednesday or  
8 Thursday, the 10th through the 11th.

9                   Q     Did anybody ask you to do this or was  
10 this on your own?

11                  A     No, this was just on my own as trying  
12 to get a visual of what we were going to have  
13 coverage on and what we weren't going to have  
14 coverage on.

15                  Q     Who did you share this with?

16                  A     I believe I shared this with [REDACTED] and  
17 maybe the rest of the team, [REDACTED] like the  
18 guys that were involved with the setup on it so  
19 they had an idea of where we were going to be at.

20                  Q     How did you share it? Did you e-mail  
21 it to them? Shoot them a text?

22                  A     I don't recall. I don't remember if I  
23 gave them a text or if I handed it to them, like  
24 printed out a copy and handed it to them.

25                  Q     And I know we've got a bit of a legend

1 here on the side. But perhaps, could you walk us  
2 through how to read this and -- the coloring is  
3 very helpful but it's a bit hard to see the  
4 buildings under it. So if you could help orient  
5 us to, perhaps, where the stage is, where AGR is  
6 on the map?

7 A Correct. A-1 is the grandstand  
8 position. That is the announcer's both position.

9 Q And is that in the middle here, sort of  
10 at the intersection of blue and pink?

11 A Where all the lines intersect, yes.

12 Q And is that where you were positioned?

13 A Yes.

14 Q Was anybody else positioned there with  
15 you?

16 A Yes. I always call everybody by their  
17 last name. [REDACTED] was his last name. And I can't  
18 think of his first name.

19 Q Is [REDACTED] also from Butler ESU?

20 A Yes. He's one of my sniper --  
21 part-time snipers on there, yes.

22 Q And what about --

23 A [REDACTED] I'm sorry.

24 Q [REDACTED]?

25 A Yes.

1           Q     Thank you.

2                     And the note here is that you would be  
3     located in the grandstand booth facing the side  
4     stage of the venue and your range is highlighted  
5     in pink?

6           A     Correct.

7           Q     So from here you can see the stage?

8           A     Correct. I could actually see clean  
9     across to AGR, but the primary area that we can  
10    see was in pink. There is a little bit of a knoll  
11    in the middle of the event area (indicating). So  
12    I was afraid that once we got past that knoll I  
13    was going to miss some stuff because I wouldn't  
14    have a very clear view of that.

15                    Which we found out later on there was a  
16    lady minutes before the event, that the shooting  
17    took place on a horseback with a flag going across  
18    it. I said to my partner, I said, "Why is that  
19    lady running back and forth with a horse with a  
20    flag like that?"

21          Q     And where was she on this map?

22          A     She was outside of the perimeter at  
23    AGR's property. And I found out after everything  
24    was over with that she was actually on horseback.  
25    I couldn't see the horse. So there was that much

1 of a grade, too, between us.

2 Q You said you could see AGR, not this  
3 woman on the horseback. Could you see your  
4 colleagues who were positioned in AG from where  
5 you were?

6 A No. Because they were inside which is  
7 what we wanted. We wanted them to be able to not  
8 be seen.

9 Q Understood. I don't have a great depth  
10 perception, so bear with me.

11 A-2 is located in the grandstand under  
12 the booth facing towards Route 68 and is  
13 highlighted in blue.

14 Do you recall who was positioned at  
15 A-2?

16 A Yes. That was Washington County  
17 snipers.

18 Q And do you recall the name of the  
19 individuals who might have been there?

20 A I'm trying to think. Ironically both  
21 of their last names were [REDACTED] but they weren't  
22 related. Or I'm sorry. The first names were Ben.  
23 One was [REDACTED] and one was -- it's an odd name.  
24 I can't remember what his name was now.

25 Q But two individuals from Washington

1 squad --

2 A Correct.

3 Q -- were posted A-2?

4 A Correct.

5 Q If I'm reading this correctly, both A-1  
6 and A-2 were located in the grandstand area, but  
7 you're positioning -- you're looking out in two  
8 different directions, essentially, as reflected by  
9 the pink and blue here?

10 A Correct. Their position was in the  
11 stands itself, so they had more of a 360-view than  
12 we did.

13 Ours was actually up in a booth that  
14 had very large windows that we could open and we  
15 could only look out one side of it.

16 Q Thank you.

17 B-1 is located inside of AGR. So are  
18 these your colleagues, [REDACTED] -- is that where  
19 [REDACTED] is?

20 A We didn't know what snipers were going  
21 to be in that building yet. We just knew that  
22 those positions were roughly where they were going  
23 to be pending their decision once they made access  
24 to that building.

25 Q Pending whose decision?

1           A     The snipers. Whoever sniper got  
2 assigned to that building.

3           Q     So to make sure I understand, was your  
4 role leading up to this to think about the  
5 positions of the various snipers but not  
6 necessarily which agency would be covering each of  
7 those posts?

8           A     I wanted somebody from Butler in that  
9 post. But it was -- we didn't have enough to  
10 cover both or all the positions with the Butler  
11 sniper. So we made sure there was one in that  
12 building and then Beaver County filled in the  
13 other two for us.

14                     But I didn't know which county was  
15 going to be at which position or if they were  
16 going to change their position inside that  
17 building.

18                     So this was, more or less, a rough  
19 draft of where we were going to be.

20           Q     Understood.

21                     When July 13th rolls around, do you  
22 recall who was at B-1 and B-2, ultimately?

23           A     I was never notified who took what  
24 positions until after the event and that's when I  
25 found out who was roughly stationed where inside

1       there.

2               Q       And who was where?

3               A       [REDACTED] was roughly where B-1 is at.  
4       And then the two from Beaver were roughly at the  
5       B-2 side. But they changed their positions to  
6       suit their -- what they felt was best for their  
7       needs for the event.

8               Q       And if I'm reading this correctly, I  
9       see B-1 and B-2 for within what's stated to be  
10      highlighted in the yellow reads a little more  
11      orange in our printout?

12              A       Right.

13              Q       B-2 is written here on top of the  
14      building in white. It does not appear to be  
15      covered in a color; is that fair?

16              A       B-2 and B-1 both have a dot that are  
17      the same color. They're hard to see. Because I  
18      just did a dot where they were roughly going to be  
19      located inside that building.

20              Q       But again, I think this goes to our  
21      discussion of sniper/counter-sniper in the  
22      perimeter or out. Their primary role is to be  
23      looking out into the crowd captured by this  
24      orange.

25                      Is anybody looking at AGR?

1           A     Correct.  You're -- we were looking  
2     into the crowd.  We had nobody assigned to look  
3     directly at AGR.

4           Q     Was that a consideration of whether  
5     anybody would be covering that area?

6           A     At this point when this map come out it  
7     was after we found out that the counter-snipers  
8     and the Secret Service were going to be there and  
9     that they were going to be on those barns.

10           So we were under the assumption that  
11     they would cover that as counter-snipers because  
12     it was one of the closest buildings to them, as  
13     well.

14           Q     And even though it's not written here  
15     in the description on this guide, I see something  
16     that says "Secret Service" in the green area?

17           A     Correct.  Meaning that they -- nobody  
18     could see behind those barns, but we figured once  
19     they were on those barns they would be able to see  
20     that area if need be.

21           But their focus was going to be out  
22     over the crowd and the surrounding buildings  
23     around them.

24           Q     Is where Secret Service is written, is  
25     that a fair approximation of where the barns are

1 from which those counter-snipers were posted?

2 A Yes.

3 Q Did you have any discussion with those  
4 counter-snipers? Did you personally speak to  
5 those counter-snipers?

6 A That day of at the event, they met up  
7 with us.

8 Q Do you recall who those counter-snipers  
9 were?

10 A [REDACTED] the last name.  
11 I'm trying to remember his first name now. I have  
12 it wrote down in my notes here.

13 [REDACTED] His partner come up  
14 with him. I don't remember his name. They come  
15 up, handed me a packet of what they were looking  
16 at. Each page had a color photograph of  
17 180-coverage around gridded off with their grid  
18 pattern that they use for a quick identification  
19 of a threat. So they could relay that information  
20 quickly to their people who are trained to do  
21 that. To us it was kind of new. I had never seen  
22 that.

23 But their photos all included from the  
24 buildings where our command post was at to their  
25 left the whole way around the event area

everything was labeled perfectly. The tractor sales was labeled. The car sales was labeled.

See a little arrow pointing down to the buildings of what their view was on top of those roofs to include AGR Building, building one, building two and you could see the majority of their rooftops of AGR.

Q Do you recall about what time of day you met with those folks?

A They contacted me at 12:58 p.m., "they" as in [REDACTED] We were in direct communication with cell phone by text and phone calls. And at 1:42 p.m. he said he wanted to have his face-to-face with us. And we met up at the grandstands then shortly thereafter.

Q Maybe we could backtrack a bit to earlier that morning. Remind me about what time you said you reported or maybe you didn't say?

A We reported to our positions?

Q Or to the site, generally?

A We were -- all of us were on site -- well, I don't want to say all of us. A couple of us were a little later getting there, but we were generally there for the 9 a.m. briefing that our team provided for the County elements that were

1 helping out at Beaver County and Washington  
2 County. And we -- once we finished our briefing  
3 we gather all of our equipment and then move to  
4 our positions so that we were in our position by  
5 11 a.m.

6 Q Who provided that briefing? I know you  
7 said "our group." Butler ESU?

8 A Butler ESU. Who the presenter for the  
9 briefing itself was [REDACTED]

10 Q Was [REDACTED] also present for that?

11 A Yes.

12 Q Did he have a presenter role or...?

13 A He answered questions or filled in  
14 information that may have been pertinent to  
15 whatever.

16 Q At that meeting with you mentioned  
17 Beaver, Washington. Was Secret Service involved  
18 in this briefing?

19 A I did not see any Secret Service there,  
20 no.

21 Q After that you said 11 a.m. you went to  
22 your post?

23 A We were in our position by 11 a.m. So  
24 after that we gather our equipment, so roughly  
25 10:30-ish we started moving out to our positions

1       then.

2               Q       And how did your position -- when was  
3       your position determined?

4               A       Prior to that date.

5               Q       Okay. I think I'm just a little  
6       confused on the timeline because we're speaking a  
7       few days before when you create this map the  
8       positions are mapped out, but I understood you to  
9       be saying you didn't know exactly who would be at  
10      each of these posts?

11              A       So you want to know what did we decide  
12      what person was going to what post?

13              Q       Yes.

14              A       Okay. We did decide that at that  
15      briefing then. And that's when it was determined  
16      that the snipers from Beaver would be over at AGR  
17      with one of our guys.

18                     The Washington guys would be in the  
19      grandstands with us.

20              Q       Thank you.

21                     So 11 a.m. you go to your position in  
22      the grandstand. Others are positioned in AGR. At  
23      any point do you meet with Secret Service that  
24      day?

25              A       Just the counter-sniper, [REDACTED]

1 [REDACTED] he met up with me. Let's see. I have  
2 the time written down. It was after 1:00. It was  
3 probably around 2:00 maybe that they showed up.

4 [REDACTED]: And I don't think we have  
5 to enter it as an exhibit, but just to reference,  
6 for the record, that the witness has brought in  
7 some materials to refresh his recollection on the  
8 timeframe.

9 BY [REDACTED]:

10 Q So around 1 p.m., 2 p.m. [REDACTED]  
11 shows up. You meet with him. How did that  
12 meeting occur? How did you find each other?

13 How did he have your contact  
14 information?

15 A He had my contact information from  
16 Thursday afternoon when I made contact with him  
17 through a phone call to see if he wanted to do a  
18 walk-through with us at the site because that was  
19 the night we were meeting to do amongst the sniper  
20 guys that were there. And he said he had already  
21 been through the site that day and he had already  
22 had their stuff plotted out and told me where they  
23 were going to be.

24 That's when I found out they were going  
25 to be on top of the barns then.

1           Q     Who else met with [REDACTED] and  
2     you?

3           A     [REDACTED] from Washington County  
4     snipers. And [REDACTED] from Butler County.

5           Q     And what did you discuss in that  
6     meeting?

7           A     We discussed the packet that he brought  
8     up to us. Asked us where our positions were. If  
9     there was anything that he needed to be concerned  
10    about identifying us to be able to clearly  
11    identify us quickly.

12                  I explained to him that we were all  
13    wearing multi cam to include Washington County  
14    snipers. So he knew that if it was somebody that  
15    wasn't in multi cam, it was not one of us.

16          Q     And what is multi cam?

17          A     It's just a modern -- the more typical  
18    camouflage that the military uses now.

19          Q     Do you have any other markings on that  
20    says...

21          A     We all had our badges with us, as well.

22          Q     And at that time Secret Service comes  
23    to understand where you are all positioned, avoid  
24    any sort of counter-sniper/sniper interaction for  
25    missing an identify, essentially?

1           A     Correct. We call it blue and blue. We  
2     don't want any good guys shooting any good guys  
3     so...

4           Q     Understood.

5                     And that packet, did he just go over it  
6     with you? Did he hand you any paperwork?

7           A     He gave me a copy of the packet. And  
8     said, "Hey, this is what we are doing. This is  
9     how we're looking at it. This is what we do to  
10    figure out threats. And how we announce them to  
11    each other." And that was basically it.

12                    And then we stood around for a couple  
13    more minutes and just talked a little sniper stuff  
14    and, you know, normal, "Hey, what do you guys  
15    shoot at? What do you use for rifle?" That kind  
16    of stuff. Just general conversation.

17          Q     So nothing really specific to action  
18    plan for the day?

19          A     Correct.

20          Q     It sounds like you two had exchanged  
21    phone numbers, you and [REDACTED]

22                    Did you have contact information for  
23    anybody else at Secret Service?

24          A     No.

25          Q     Any other way of communicating with

1       them?

2               A       No.

3               Q       Did you receive a radio that you could  
4       speak with them on?

5               A       I was going to say, I did offer him a  
6       radio because we had our radio communications for  
7       our team. We made sure that Washington County had  
8       our same radios. We made sure that Beaver County  
9       had our same radios. And I told [REDACTED] I  
10      said, "Hey, when we're done, you're going right  
11      past our command post." I said, "they should have  
12      radios for you. If they don't, call me or text  
13      me. I'll get you one of our radios down to you so  
14      you have one of our radios."

15              Q       And, to your knowledge, did  
16      [REDACTED] or any other Secret Service agent pick up  
17      the radio?

18              A       I never heard another word about it.

19              Q       And absent that physical radio, would  
20      Secret Service have any way of monitoring the  
21      frequencies that you were on?

22              A       I don't know what radio system they  
23      would be operating on or if they would have that  
24      capability.

25              Q       And what channels were you monitoring

1 on your radio that day?

2 A Just police Ops 4, which is our  
3 tactical communication channel.

4 Q And if I'm following correctly, that  
5 day Butler, Washington and Beaver ESU all had the  
6 same radios and were all -- were you all  
7 monitoring Ops 4 on that channel?

8 A Correct.

9 Q Is that radio capable of monitoring any  
10 other channels?

11 A It is if you put it on scan. The  
12 problem with that is once it's on scan, the radios  
13 are designated with a priority channel and that  
14 channel will take priority over the channel we're  
15 on.

16 So if we had to relay anything right  
17 away, we wouldn't be able to if somebody was  
18 talking on that other channel because it would  
19 connect to than channel instead.

20 Q And is the priority channel set to a  
21 particular channel or just to be the channel that  
22 somebody is speaking on at the moment?

23 A Usually it's the police operations  
24 channel for the county.

25 Q And which channel is that?

1           A     It depends on which radio was set up.  
2     It depends on the department's radio. We had a  
3     mixture of radios from different departments.  
4     Some departments are on police 2. Some  
5     departments are on police 1 so that they don't  
6     have a lot of radio traffic on one channel.

7                     So my particular radio was designated  
8     for police 2, which would be the Butler Township  
9     area. So if mine would have been on channel 2, if  
10    they're talking on the radio, I would have no  
11    communication, no way to hear anything that was  
12    going on on our Ops channel at that time. It kind  
13    of would have blocked it out or taken priority  
14    over everything.

15           Q     How is it determined that Ops 4 would  
16    be the channel for the tactical teams?

17           A     That was the channel that was  
18    determined through our command staff and anybody  
19    that was putting together this op plan for this  
20    event so that we were all in the same command --  
21    or same channel and had direct line of  
22    communication with each other.

23           Q     Are you aware of other channels being  
24    operational that day for other law enforcement  
25    agencies at the site?

1 A Not until after the event.

2 Q Who else is listening to Ops 4? And  
3 specifically I'm trying to get at, is there a  
4 command post?

5 Is there a somebody listening in to  
6 monitor not only Ops 4 by other channels?

7 A Yes. Our command post had Ops 4  
8 listening to it. They also had the local police  
9 channels going. And I believe they had some fire  
10 channels in there for the fire EMS going, as well.

11 So they were trying to listen to all  
12 emergency communications from the county level out  
13 of our command center.

14 Q Who was listening?

15 A Commander [REDACTED] was in there. And I  
16 don't know who all else was in that command center  
17 with him.

18 Q Do you have any understanding of [REDACTED]  
19 [REDACTED] or others in that command post having a way  
20 of contacting Secret Service?

21 A I don't know personally.

22 Q Did you hear anything about Secret  
23 Service being in that command post?

24 A I did not hear anything about Secret  
25 Service being there.

1           Q     Are you aware of Secret Service having  
2     a command post of their own?

3           A     I did hear that after the fact.  
4     Actually on our -- the one bigger map that was put  
5     out later on towards -- I think it was that day  
6     that we got them. And it did show that Secret  
7     Service and PSP had a command post up by Route 68  
8     entrance. And then the Butler County command post  
9     was down beside the stage area.

10           So that's when I found out that there  
11     was actually two command posts.

12           Q     So it was that day that you saw this  
13     map and found out?

14           A     Yes.

15           Q     And you just mentioned PSP. Was  
16     anybody from PSP in that local command post with  
17     your colleagues?

18           A     To my knowledge, not to the county  
19     command post but I wasn't there. I don't know who  
20     all was in and out of there.

21           Q     We haven't spoken really much about PSP  
22     yet. What was their role on July 13th?

23           A     I don't know. I was told that they  
24     were there in uniform to assist with uniform  
25     duties. But I don't know what else they were

1 involved with.

2 Q So sort of patrol-type duties or...?

3 A I believe so. Patrol or just in the  
4 event as uniformed staff to assist with security.

5 Q It sounds like you knew that they were  
6 in the Secret Service command post. Any  
7 understanding of the interactions between those  
8 two agencies, between PSP and Secret Service?

9 A I don't know.

10 Q Staying on the topic of communications  
11 for a moment. We've spoken about -- you had cell  
12 phone coverage.

13 Do you carry one phone, two phones?

14 A Just one.

15 Q Just one phone. And that's the phone  
16 number that you had shared with the Secret Service  
17 agent.

18 Are you texting that day at all?

19 A We started a text group amongst the  
20 county snipers for general purposes, to state --  
21 to keep radio transmissions to emergency stuff.  
22 So if they had a question of, "Hey, are we getting  
23 somebody to relieve us for something to eat." Or  
24 "Hey, where is the bathroom at" to us. Any stupid  
25 little conversation that didn't need to go over

1 the radio, we had the text message group set up  
2 for all the snipers to use.

3 Q Do you recall who was on that text  
4 message and thread?

5 A Every sniper that was involved with  
6 that with the exception of Secret Service. We  
7 kept them off it because we didn't feel they  
8 needed to be burdened with our minuet little text  
9 like that.

10 Q Was that a discussion you had with  
11 Secret Service? Did you ever say, "Do you want to  
12 be on our text thread"?

13 A No. No. I just felt that their job  
14 was counter-sniper and they needed to be -- I  
15 didn't want to impede on their job at all and I  
16 didn't -- I wouldn't want to be impeded on ours  
17 and that's why I strictly said, like, this is just  
18 for basic communication. You know, I checked in  
19 on the guys on occasion, "Hey, everybody good?  
20 You need anything?"

21 And then when the motorcade finally  
22 arrived I just put a text out and said like, "game  
23 time" or "game on" or something so that they knew  
24 that he was on site now, to really start focusing  
25 on your job.

1           Q     Did you have any concerns about your  
2     ability to communicate with Secret Service if  
3     needed to communicate with those counter-snipers?

4           A     No.    Because I assumed that they had  
5     picked up our radios.   So I assumed that they  
6     would be able to hear us if something came across  
7     our radios that was of concern.

8                     I did text the counter-sniper when we  
9     got the picture sent through our group chat of  
10    Mr. Crooks.   Because it doesn't matter if I call  
11    them by radio, by phone, e-mail him.   The only way  
12    he's going to know who we're looking for is to  
13    actually get a picture of him.

14                    So I felt it was faster just to send  
15    him a text with a picture and the information I  
16    got as soon as possible so that he knew who they  
17    were looking for so that he could get eyes on him.

18           Q     And that was by text message?

19           A     Correct.

20           Q     Were you using Signal with anybody that  
21    day?

22           A     There -- I don't believe -- yeah, I  
23    think I sent it out on Signal after the fact  
24    because I heard on our radios then, some of our  
25    guys that were already kind of looking for this

1       guy, they didn't know -- they were like, "What's  
2       the description of this guy? What's he look  
3       like?"

4                So I put it on our text app so that it  
5       would go out to everybody. So anybody that was  
6       looking for him would have it on their phone  
7       instantly.

8                Q       And help me understand the difference  
9       between using text or Signal and which friends are  
10      on which.

11               Who are you communicating with on  
12      Signal?

13               A       Sorry. Signal is a text app. It's a  
14      group text with the ESU team itself. So anybody  
15      that's on the team is in that group. So it's just  
16      to our operators, our command staff, anybody  
17      that's specifically on our Butler County ESU team.

18               Q       Is that standard practice or something  
19      that you used that day?

20               A       No, it's something that we've used for  
21      a while prior to that.

22               Q       And why Signal as opposed to any other  
23      channel?

24               A       I don't know who picked it or why.

25               Q       So that's sort of the broader group ESU

operators command. And then the text thread that you're talking about with local snipers, that's sort of regular text message?

A Correct, through regular SMS texting.

Q And I see I'm coming up on time.

██████████ You can take more time if you want to finish an area.

██████████: Let me just check.

BY ██████████:

Q While we're on the text messages, maybe you could just take a look at this for a moment with me. We can call this Exhibit B.

(Exhibit B was marked for identification.)

BY ██████████:

Q And it's got a few different screen shots on it.

██████████: Just for reference, your previous exhibit was 1. Do you want to stay with numbers or letters?

██████████ That should be A.

██████████: Sorry. Previous exhibit should be A. This exhibit should be B.

BY ██████████:

Q So Exhibit B is a two-page document

that had a few screenshots of a text message thread. At the top we've labeled them IMG\_0531 through 0535.

This the local sniper thread that you were talking about?

A Correct. It appears to be, this is Beaver County sniper [REDACTED] text thread, yes.

Q Meaning [REDACTED] was --

A These are his still shots from his phone, yes.

Q Thank you.

And I see the 1:45 message here, "SS counter-sniper team will be heading to the grandstands to meet up with us in a couple minutes."

That's the discussion we mentioned earlier with [REDACTED]

A Correct.

Q And do you recall very well this "game time" message at around 5:34 p.m.? That indicates that Mr. Trump's motorcade is arriving at the site?

A Correct. They had just pulled on site, yes.

Q And then not too long later, a few minutes later [REDACTED] sends out two photos.

At this time, did you understand who this individual was?

A No, but I knew if they were sending me pictures of it, it was somebody that they were interested in and getting more information on. That this person was obviously -- because the pictures came through with the 5:38 p.m. text about the kid loitering around the building, that all came through as one text.

So I knew right then that they were looking at this person as a suspicious person around that building, that they wanted somebody else to intervene with or to make contact with.

Q And [REDACTED] if I recall, is positioned in the AGR Building, so presumably this individual is somewhere close to him?

A Correct.

Q Right. And he says --

A He's the one that took the pictures out the window and was straight down on him.

Q And the text message from [REDACTED] says, "I did see him with a range finder looking towards the stage."

1                   What does that signal to you that  
2                   somebody has a range finder?

3                   A       He's not golfing. He's not going to  
4                   take a shot with a golf ball. It means to us it's  
5                   a shooting thing. It's a -- you want to know your  
6                   distance so you know what your trajectory is for  
7                   your bullet. So that makes it a little bit more  
8                   of a priority for us.

9                   Q       And it becomes a priority. What do you  
10                  do to respond to that message?

11                  A       My response was call in to command and  
12                  have a uniform check it out. Because he texted  
13                  me, I'm thinking to myself, don't text me. Put it  
14                  over the radio. That's important. So I waited --  
15                  the times on these obviously don't give you  
16                  seconds, so it could be less than a minute, less  
17                  than two minutes, whatever.

18                  But as soon as I reply back, I waited  
19                  and I'm listening for the radio call to come in to  
20                  command and there was nothing. So I grabbed my  
21                  cell phone and I called the command post. I  
22                  started with [REDACTED] because I didn't want  
23                  to bother Commander [REDACTED] because I figured he was  
24                  the busiest of the group in there.

25                  So I tried [REDACTED]. I forgot he

wasn't going to be there until later and what time he was going to get there.

So when I didn't get ahold of him then I called Commander [REDACTED] on his cell phone. And as soon as he answered the phone, then [REDACTED] started relaying the information over the radio. So I just -- I waited until he was done. I said, "That's all I was calling for to make sure you got that," and then I hung up the phone again.

Q So if I understand it, you said -- you respond, to [REDACTED] call it in to command. You expect he'll call it in over the radio what he is seeing.

When you don't hear that over the radio, you pick up your phone to call first [REDACTED], remember he's not there, then [REDACTED] and around the same time you hear it come over the radio?

A Right because I didn't want to tie up the channel myself if [REDACTED] was trying to call it in over the radio. Because I didn't want to relay information that wasn't a hundred percent accurate as what [REDACTED] could because [REDACTED] was the one with eyes on. So I didn't want to mess anything up so I was just getting ahold of Commander [REDACTED] to let

him know, "Hey, this is what they got going on. We need to get somebody over there to check this out." Uniform officer, patrol officer, whatever, anybody that could be over there to walk around the property and start looking to this guy.

Q Who would you think is the right group, organization to be responding in patrol at that time?

A I didn't know. I didn't know who was available. I didn't know if they had designated people inside the event that could respond out. I didn't know if they had people just on patrol outside the event that were patrolling around that could check it out.

I didn't know who they would have specifically for responding to suspicious persons.

Q Is it fair to say your understanding, though, would be calling [REDACTED], calling [REDACTED] in the command post? That's the purpose of the command post, so that they could then call --

A They could delegate.

Q Say to their colleagues and patrol, "Get your guys out there"?

A Sorry. I didn't mean to overtalk.

1 Yes, to delegate. Because I figured  
2 that command post should know everybody's duties  
3 and who is assigned to be able to respond out to  
4 take care of that stuff.

5 Q Understood. And the last question,  
6 before I seek my time, [REDACTED] does say, "If you  
7 wanna notify SS snipers to look out."

8 As I read that, [REDACTED] knew that you  
9 had at least one of the Secret Service sniper's  
10 contact information --

11 A Correct.

12 Q -- is that right?

13 Did you notify Secret Service?

14 A Correct, I did. That's when I sent  
15 [REDACTED] that -- I copied and pasted that same  
16 two pictures and his initial text of the kid  
17 loitering around. I copied that and pasted it and  
18 sent it to [REDACTED]

19 He responded back at the same time and  
20 said, "Roger that. I will have the guys on AGR  
21 side watch for him."

22 [REDACTED]: Okay. Thank you.

23 [REDACTED] Do you want to take a short  
24 break?

25 [REDACTED]: Yes.

(Brief recess from 2:53 p.m. - 2:59 p.m.)

EXAMINATION

BY [REDACTED]

Q [REDACTED] I'm going to go a little back in time from the last set of questions that you were talking to the Minority about. And where you and I left off was really on July 11th or so when there was a walk-through that you did not participate in between -- with the Secret Service and a lot of the local law enforcement that was going to be supporting their efforts.

So just taking you back to that week before the event. You mentioned that you had taken a tour, effectively, of the building on July 9th evening.

At what point, if any, did you take a tour of the actual site itself?

A I believe it was Wednesday.

Q Wednesday?

A Yes, it was Wednesday, July 10th.

Q Okay.

A At 4:00 that afternoon.

Q Okay. And what was the reason why you were out there to take the tour?

A Because we wanted to see what the event

1 site was going to look like, try to get a mind --  
2 a picture in our mind of what it was going to look  
3 like. And to determine other positions inside  
4 that Farm Show grounds as to where we wanted to  
5 put the rest of our snipers at.

6 Q Understood.

7 And was that something that you were  
8 asked to do or was that something you understood  
9 you were supposed to do?

10 A It was just something I wanted to do  
11 because we weren't getting any direction on where  
12 they wanted us, what they wanted us to do  
13 specifically.

14 So between myself, [REDACTED] and  
15 [REDACTED] -- [REDACTED] is a commander  
16 but he's also one of our snipers, as well.

17 We all went out and walked around the  
18 event area to see what gave us the best vantage  
19 points of the event area itself.

20 Q Okay. Were you concerned that you  
21 hadn't gotten direction from Secret Security, for  
22 example, about where they wanted you?

23 A A little bit. But I have never really  
24 dealt with the Secret Service so I just thought  
25 maybe it was normal that they would wait until the

1 last minute to tell us what exactly what they  
2 wanted. But it was just trying to figure it out  
3 on our own, basically.

4 Q Understood.

5 And you mentioned you have not worked  
6 with Secret Service before so you didn't know if  
7 that was unusual or not?

8 A Correct.

9 Q Did anybody -- did Commander [REDACTED] or  
10 anyone else, [REDACTED] or anyone mention to you or  
11 suggest to you that they were concerned that they  
12 received no specific guidance?

13 A No. We didn't talk about that part of  
14 it at all. We just talked about what my squad's  
15 detail was and what we needed to get set up for,  
16 as far as in-house stuff.

17 Q How much time would you say you spent  
18 touring the event site that day?

19 A We did about two hours that day walking  
20 around it. And then I went back on Friday the  
21 12th at about 6 p.m., myself, and did another  
22 walk-through. Because that's when I mentioned  
23 that I drove past and seen all the tents.

24 So I went through and went to every  
25 position, aside from AGR, to make sure that we

1 still had a good enough view from the grandstands,  
2 especially, to overwatch the event area.

3 Q And you didn't feel the need to check  
4 AGR because you had already checked it?

5 A Well, it was -- it wasn't that. It was  
6 a matter of I didn't have the contact that [REDACTED]  
7 had with them, so I didn't want to just go walk  
8 around their property or ask permission to go into  
9 their building.

10 So I walked up to the fence line,  
11 roughly in line of where the snipers were going to  
12 tentatively be, to get a view of the stage and  
13 stuff. I just kind of took pictures of the  
14 different vantage points that we took before, but  
15 now with everything set up, so we knew if anything  
16 had changed or not.

17 Q Now, when you took that tour did you  
18 understand, at least roughly speaking, what the  
19 perimeter would be for that event?

20 A The only thing I knew of any kind of a  
21 perimeter was the fence line. Just because it was  
22 a physical perimeter.

23 Q Right.

24 A I didn't know if they had any other  
25 outer perimeters around it or anything like that.

1 It wasn't until the day I met with the [REDACTED]  
2 [REDACTED] face to face of the event that one of  
3 his pictures had a circle, a 400-yard circle  
4 around it and AGR was actually inside that circle.

5 That was the first time I knew they  
6 actually had a nonphysical perimeter.

7 Q Okay. Understood.

8 Was it your understanding that Butler  
9 ESU was responsible for security around the  
10 perimeter?

11 A Of the event itself?

12 Q Yes.

13 A No. Our responsibility was inside the  
14 event.

15 Q Okay. And did you have an  
16 understanding of who was responsible for the  
17 perimeter at that point?

18 A The only thing I knew was it was going  
19 to be patrol officers that were on duty from  
20 Butler Township and State Police.

21 Q Okay. So after you spent a couple  
22 hours checking the site out, did you go back and  
23 start putting together a plan of action for  
24 deploying your snipers?

25 A No. We -- I was able to determine that

1       our plan stayed as we had already previously  
2       determined. Nothing had changed because of the  
3       way the tents and everything were set up. It  
4       didn't impede any of our view.

5               Q       Okay. So it basically confirmed what  
6       you already expected?

7               A       Correct. I just wanted to reassure  
8       that there was no issues or no -- nothing blocking  
9       any potential views for us.

10              Q       Did you have any area that you were  
11       assigned to that you were -- for your  
12       responsibilities that you were concerned you did  
13       not have coverage for?

14              A       Not until the day of the event. And  
15       then it was just one simple thing. They just put  
16       a couple media trucks in there with the big  
17       satellite dishes on them and it blocked my view of  
18       the crowd or the bleachers behind the stage area.

19                     That was just a small portion of it, so  
20       I didn't really consider it a major concern. I  
21       figured if they were in the bleachers, they were  
22       pretty well vetted to get to that point.

23              Q       Okay. And then people had -- when you  
24       say vetted, they had gone through the security to  
25       get into the event?

1           A     Metal detector, stuff like that, yes.

2           Q     Okay. So then on the Thursday -- well,  
3 let me ask you this: Did you ever -- before the  
4 day of the event did you return at all to the site  
5 to do any further checks?

6           A     Just that Friday night. That was it.  
7 Nothing else.

8           Q     All right. And before the 13th, remind  
9 me if you had had contact with the Beaver ESU  
10 snipers at that point?

11          A     I didn't meet them until Saturday  
12 morning.

13          Q     Saturday Morning. Okay.  
14 Did you have any contact with Beaver at  
15 all before Saturday morning?

16          A     No.

17          Q     Do you know who was talking to Beaver,  
18 if anybody, from Butler ESU?

19          A     It would have been our command staff.  
20 I'm not sure if it was [REDACTED] or [REDACTED] or who it  
21 was.

22          Q     Okay. You understood, though, by the  
23 time of the event that Beaver was also going to be  
24 providing support for the sniper service?

25          A     Correct.

1           Q     Did you know specifically who it was  
2 going to be? Did you know people at Beaver?

3           A     No, I didn't know who specifically was  
4 being assigned to us with them.

5           Q     And before we get to the 13th itself,  
6 anything else that you did from the times that you  
7 went, the 10th, to tour the site until the day of  
8 the event?

9                     Anything else that you did that stands  
10 out to prepare for that?

11          A     The only thing that stood out to me  
12 was, that concerned me, Friday night was the lack  
13 of security of the event site. I walked in in a  
14 pair of shorts and a tank shirt. And was walking  
15 through the event area, walking through where they  
16 were setting chairs up, walking around the stage,  
17 taking pictures with my cell phone. And I was  
18 there for maybe an hour or so and not one person  
19 come up to me and asked me who I was or what I was  
20 doing.

21          Q     Okay.

22          A     So that kind of concerned me. But I  
23 thought, well maybe it's normal. Like, maybe the  
24 day of the event they're a lot more strict with  
25 their security. I don't know.

1           Q     Were they more strict with the security  
2     on the day of the event?

3           A     I didn't specifically see their  
4     security. I know a lot of people from the public  
5     that went and expressed concern about it  
6     afterwards. But that's their opinions and I don't  
7     have any facts for it.

8           Q     Got it. Okay.

9                     And I think, again, this is kind of an  
10    obvious question, but I will ask it for the  
11    record.

12                    Why were you concerned when you visited  
13    and there didn't seem to be anyone checking who  
14    you were?

15           A     I just assumed that -- like I said,  
16    I've never dealt with any kind of a presidential  
17    or ex-presidential rally. So I just assumed being  
18    a political candidate that there would be a lot  
19    more security with it. But I have never dealt  
20    with it, so I thought maybe that is normal.

21                    I don't know. Because it was more than  
22    24 hours before -- well, roughly 24 hours before  
23    he was going to be on stage. So I assumed they  
24    had security procedures that they would follow  
25    through with after I had left, whether it was the

1 next morning, that night, whatever. But, so I  
2 just assumed that --

3 Because I didn't see anybody that stood  
4 out as Secret Service or Homeland Security or  
5 anything governmental that would show that they're  
6 in charge of that event site. It was more people  
7 in street clothes just putting up chairs and  
8 stuff. So I don't know who they were, if they  
9 were just volunteers or what but...

10 Q Did you report your concern to anyone?

11 A No. I didn't have a way to report it  
12 until the next day when we talked about it at the  
13 briefing. And I said I was walking around last  
14 night and nobody checked me but...

15 Q But before that you --

16 A No.

17 Q Okay. So let's now go to July 13th.  
18 Roughly what time did you show up at the event  
19 site?

20 A I was there by 9:00. I was there  
21 probably about 8:30.

22 Q And what -- and you came -- you went to  
23 the briefing, the initial briefing that they were  
24 having, Butler --

25 A The Butler County ESU briefing, yes.

1 Q Right. And that was led by Commander

2 [REDACTED]

3 A Commander [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].

4 Q [REDACTED]. Okay.

5 What was their -- what did they say, in  
6 general terms, to the group that was assembled?

7 A They just basically went over the op  
8 plan of who was assigned to what positions. The  
9 channels that we were going to be on. The contact  
10 information. Stuff like that. They had a real  
11 brief spot on there about the sniper team. And  
12 then I met with the Beaver County and Washington  
13 County snipers afterwards with a map and just went  
14 over, "Hey, this is where we're going to be at.  
15 You guys are going here. You guys are going  
16 there." And that was it.

17 Q Right. And you were -- when I say  
18 "you," you, I mean Butler ESU was making the  
19 determinations, designating people to particular  
20 areas from Beaver and from Washington?

21 A Correct. Correct. Just, from my  
22 understanding they -- the commanders were given  
23 direction of what they -- what the Secret Service  
24 wanted from us as far as two [REDACTED]  
25 and a counterassault team and the snipers. And

1 they let it up to us as to who we were putting on  
2 each one and where we were posting them and that  
3 kind of stuff so...

4 Q Okay. And was there anything different  
5 about what was explained by Commander [REDACTED] and  
6 [REDACTED] about the plan for that day than what  
7 you had understood before that day?

8 A No. It was pretty much the same thing.

9 Q So there were no surprises?

10 A No.

11 Q Did anyone at that briefing express to  
12 you any concern about the plan?

13 A No.

14 Q Did you have any sense that there was  
15 concern about the plan? Even if someone didn't  
16 say anything?

17 A No, nobody indicated that they were  
18 concerned with anything that -- specifically what  
19 we were going to do because I didn't -- once the  
20 briefing was done we broke off into our groups of  
21 who was going where. And then we had a little  
22 internal meeting of what our jobs were  
23 specifically. And nobody that was assigned the  
24 sniper element showed any concerns of any  
25 positions or anything like that.

1           Q     Okay. And in terms of the  
2           communication that was going to -- you all would  
3           have to be communicating.

4                     Just tell us again what was your  
5           understanding of how people were going to  
6           communicate in that group, that Butler-led ESU  
7           group?

8           A     The Butler-led ESU group we were on  
9           police Ops 4.

10          Q     Police Ops 4?

11          A     And that was the channel that we were  
12         going to use because it was a channel specifically  
13         that we use a lot for our warrants and stuff like  
14         that.

15          Q     Okay. And this would cover everyone in  
16         that group or just the snipers?

17          A     It covered anybody that was involved  
18         with Butler ESU, Beaver ESU or Washington ESU.  
19         And at the time we assumed it was going to be the  
20         Secret Service counter-snipers at least, at the  
21         very least.

22          Q     And when you say you assume that you  
23         thought they would have access to that?

24          A     Well, we knew that we had radios set  
25         aside for them and they weren't there yet, so at

1       that point we had to assume that they were going  
2       to get the radios as we had planned.

3               Q     Right.  Okay.  Got it.

4                    So did you have any concern about  
5       communication -- the ability to communicate at  
6       that point?

7               A     Not after the briefing.  It was later  
8       on in the day that we did that.

9               Q     And at the briefing -- and I know where  
10      you're heading.

11              A     Yeah.

12              Q     At the briefing was there any  
13      discussion of potential problems with cell phone  
14      service or radio service?

15              A     No.  There was nothing mentioned about  
16      it.

17              Q     Was there any -- was it protocol or  
18      permissible to use your cell phone to communicate  
19      with other members of the team as needed?

20              A     There's no standard on when or when not  
21      to use a cell phone.  It's more of a judgment  
22      call.  That's why I set up the sniper text group  
23      as a non-emergent, just a baseline of  
24      communication if they had an irrelevant question,  
25      that we can use that without tying up the radio

frequency to do so. And that way everybody that was involved with the snipers were all on the same page and all had the same information at the same time.

Q Okay. I know you mentioned that later on in the day concerns did arise. Tell us about that.

A The concerns that did arrive were from Beaver County sniper [REDACTED] who got pictures of Mr. Crooks then. And he sent those pictures out through that text group. So I informed him right away call that into command, because that was something I expected to go over the radio, not just come through text.

Q Right.

A I appreciated the pictures, but I expected a radio call, as well, in conjunction with that.

Q Before we get to that, before we get to the specifics of that issue, my question is really more about at any point in the day prior to Crooks being identified.

Were there concerns about the ability to communicate using cell phones, for example?

A I'm sorry. I misunderstood the

1 question initially.

2 No there was never any concern. Nobody  
3 ever said to me, like, "Hey, we're having issues."  
4 Or, "Hey, did you get my text?" Or "I tried  
5 calling you. It's not going through."

6 I didn't know anything about any issues  
7 with the cell phone service until after the event.

8 Q Until after the event had happened --  
9 until after the assassination attempt had  
10 occurred?

11 A Even after that I didn't get back to  
12 the command post until after 8:00 that night. So  
13 I didn't hear about it until after that even.

14 Q Okay. So you were not aware during  
15 that -- during the course of the day that people  
16 were having trouble communicating --

17 A Correct.

18 Q -- by cell?

19 A Correct.

20 Q Do you use FirstNet?

21 A I had FirstNet and I canceled it  
22 because I didn't get the coverage I expected from  
23 it. So I'm not on FirstNet and I still didn't  
24 seem to have any issues with getting text  
25 messages.

1 Q What was your service?

2 A AT&T.

3 Q AT&T. Okay.

4 So you didn't experience any issues?

5 You didn't hear about any issues?

6 A No.

7 Q Before we get, again, to the Crooks  
8 element, tell us about where you were having  
9 people, the snipers deploy and yourself, as well?

10 A I had -- we had discussed about  
11 positions that we could look into the event to do  
12 our overwatch duties, which is what we were under  
13 the understanding that's what our jobs were.

14 So we looked at AGR. We had the  
15 snipers -- or decided to set a couple snipers up  
16 inside the AGR Building because we knew that with  
17 the limited amount of snipers we had we wouldn't  
18 be able to perform security of that property as  
19 well.

20 So they were going to be inside that  
21 building so that they could be secured inside  
22 without having to worry about anybody coming up  
23 behind them or intervening with them in any way  
24 that would be a negative fashion.

25 And we decided to set up at the

grandstands the other two county elements so that we had a view of the Route 68 side of the event area. And we had a view that overlapped into the event area itself.

So all of our positions overlapped our views so that there was really no blind spots for anybody. So that we had good coverage of the event the whole way around.

That's when we found out that the counter-snipers from the Secret Service were going to be on top of the barn. So we knew that their view was going to be straight out over the crowd and they would have the view out behind the barn, so that none of us other county snipers would have the view of.

And it wasn't until that day of the event that I met with him that I found out that they actually had a good view of AGR and the whole way around of the outer buildings so...

Q Did anyone during that day, before the Crooks' events actually occurred, express any concern about the AGR Building to you?

A That Tuesday night that we toured it, [REDACTED] myself, and [REDACTED] all agreed that it was definitely a -- we got a bad vibe. We

1 got a bad feeling about it.

2 We're like, "Hey, we need to have  
3 people over here. Somebody needs to be over here  
4 in uniform just patrolling the grounds." The  
5 owner didn't want anybody on the property except  
6 for the police. And he just -- he wanted to the  
7 keep people off there. And we were just, like,  
8 this is -- in relation to the event area, we're  
9 like it's just a bad spot. It's too easily  
10 accessible for the public.

11 So I wasn't able to go to the meeting  
12 the next day but [REDACTED] did. And he told me  
13 he expressed his concerns to two of the Secret  
14 Service agents. I believe they were the two that  
15 were directly setting up the event, as far as  
16 security goes.

17 Q And I'm sorry if we're treading equal  
18 ground a little bit, but tell us why you had the  
19 bad feeling?

20 What was it about the building that  
21 made you have a bad feeling?

22 A It wasn't necessarily just the  
23 building. It was the property itself because the  
24 property was easily accessible from Whitestown  
25 Road, which is -- everything was outside of the

1 Farm Show grounds property.

2 So we didn't know who they were going  
3 to have for security. All we knew was there was a  
4 four-foot fence. That was the only physical  
5 barrier to keep people from just walking into the  
6 event itself. But it had no obscure view of the  
7 event area either.

8 There were some trees there but they  
9 were ground level. You're able to see around the  
10 trees. We just felt that between the water tower  
11 side of the building and the whole way up across  
12 that property was easy access from even Meridian  
13 Road side.

14 Or if there was nobody out there to  
15 stop anybody from coming on that property, they  
16 could just walk up that property line, which  
17 happened with the horses and everything else later  
18 on so...

19 Q Right. As you mentioned, right.

20 So, just so I understand, the concern  
21 was that you felt that it needed to be secured.  
22 And I think you previously testified, part of that  
23 concern was security. If you're going to have  
24 your own snipers in that building. You need it to  
25 be secure.

1           The perimeter of that building needs to  
2       be secure for their safety and also for their  
3       mission, right?

4           A       Correct.

5           Q       And then another reason is that people  
6       could walk up. Like, the horses you mentioned  
7       ride up and you need to have -- you thought there  
8       needed to be a patrol to make sure that kind of  
9       thing was controlled, basically?

10          A       Correct. And even if our snipers were  
11       positioned outside on the roof, they still would  
12       have no way to physically control the crowd that  
13       would be forming on the ground because they  
14       wouldn't be able to just leave their position to  
15       go down and chase people out.

16                 Because once we're in tactical gear  
17       we're higher level of force than a uniformed  
18       officer. So for -- you wouldn't send a bribe  
19       brigade in to get a couple people off your  
20       property.

21          Q       Right.

22          A       So we still wouldn't have been able to  
23       intervene. We still would have done the same  
24       thing we did by calling in the commander asking  
25       for uniformed officers to come over.

Q Did you have any concerns -- because you mentioned the lack of obscure view from that building and that property.

Did you have any concerns about a sniper potentially stationing him or herself in that building -- around that building, on the roof or...?

A No. Mainly because our initial thought was people on the ground, people on the property. And then the next day when [REDACTED] spoke with the Secret Service he told me later on that he spoke with [REDACTED] as well, that day. And [REDACTED] had told him that they usually would put a black screen of some kind up on a site that they felt might be a close threat to obscure any view into the event.

So at that point we had to assume that that's what was going to happen. And when we showed up Saturday and there was nothing, we were kind of like, "Oh," we were expecting --

Q Right. Understood.

A -- something else.

Q So, again, just to break it down, when you first went around the site you identified that the property as being -- the AGR property as being

1 potentially a problem.

2 At least, theoretically, it could be  
3 used by a sniper, right?

4 A Well, snipers were there, yes.

5 Q Right. I'm talking about on the  
6 July 9th?

7 A Yeah, we didn't anticipate it as far as  
8 somebody being on the roof of that and using it as  
9 an elevated platform to take a shot because there  
10 was no staircases or exterior means of getting up  
11 there, as far as intentionally to be able to get  
12 up on the roof.

13 There was no, like, fire escapes or  
14 anything like that. So we didn't look at that  
15 type of a concern with it at first or really at  
16 all. It wasn't until after the event that, yeah,  
17 we looked at it that way then.

18 Q Okay. I understand.

19 And then when you mentioned that the  
20 Secret Service had said to [REDACTED] that we were  
21 going to put up some kind of screen and that you  
22 were surprised on the day of the event that there  
23 was no screen, right?

24 A Correct. Yeah, he said that -- the  
25 Secret Service counter-sniper said that a lot of

1 the events like, that they will use a large black  
2 screen to cover any potential views that they feel  
3 are -- could be dangerous or cause issues.

4 But the other thing with the sniper on  
5 the roof thing is at that point after we expressed  
6 our concern we were under the understanding they  
7 were going to take care of it because they said,  
8 "We will handle that. We will take care of that  
9 for you."

10 Q Right. And they were also dealing with  
11 the -- they were the counter-snipers? They were  
12 the Secret Service?

13 A They, as in the Secret Service agents  
14 who were in charge of the event --

15 Q Right.

16 A -- told [REDACTED] that that would be  
17 covered. That ground would be covered with  
18 somebody.

19 Q Right. But you also understood, from  
20 your conversations with your colleagues, that  
21 Secret Service was handling counter-snipping  
22 duties from the stage?

23 A Correct. Correct. And the view that  
24 they would have from where they were at looking  
25 out they would be able to see a lot of that

1 building.

2 Q When you notice that there was no black  
3 screen and you were surprised, did anyone ask any  
4 questions of the Secret Service, that you're aware  
5 of, to find out why there was no black screen?

6 A I don't believe so, no.

7 Q Was there -- did you talk to others  
8 that you were with, your colleagues about the fact  
9 there was no black screen?

10 A Nothing other than we -- I was, like,  
11 "Oh. I thought they were going to put a screen up  
12 there but apparently they decided not to," or they  
13 felt it didn't need it.

14 I didn't know why they didn't do it. I  
15 don't know what their position was to not do it.

16 Q Right. But also your understanding was  
17 that the counter-snipers from the Secret Service  
18 that was their responsibility, so that was  
19 something they were going to handle. And their  
20 decision not to put it up is not something that --

21 A Correct. It was --

22 Q That wasn't within your set of  
23 responsibilities? You had enough?

24 A Sorry. I keep talking over you.

25 Q That's okay.

1           A     Yes, I didn't feel that that was our  
2 responsibility to make a concern with that.

3           Q     Okay. So as the day goes on on  
4 July 13th, I think people start being allowed into  
5 the event at 1:00, that afternoon, roughly 1:00?

6           A     Yeah.

7           Q     Where are you posted at this point when  
8 people start coming in?

9           A     When people started going in I was  
10 actually already in the press box of the  
11 announcer's booth at the grandstands.

12          Q     Okay. And did you stay there for the  
13 duration?

14          A     Yes.

15          Q     Okay. Did any concerns arise prior to  
16 the Crooks' issue? Were there any concerns that  
17 were -- any serious concerns -- not like there's  
18 somebody strange in the crowd -- that arose before  
19 that point?

20          A     No major security concerns. We just  
21 watched a couple people that had come in. And,  
22 like, one guy specifically he had his face covered  
23 with a Gaiter and had a Boonie hat on. He made  
24 his way pretty quick towards the stage. So we  
25 were keeping an eye on him but then he stopped by

the cell phone towers and it looked like he was just trying to meet up with his friends.

So we kind of brushed it off at that point and he was no longer a concern. We didn't see him do anything strange after that.

So after that we were just basically focusing on the crowd itself and just watching for any odd behaviors.

Q And what was the -- how much contact did you have with [REDACTED] and with [REDACTED] during the course of the day from Butler 4, I think it's called?

A Yeah, Butler Ops 4.

Q Butler Ops 4.

A We didn't really talk on the radio channel at all unless there was something major going on. So the only communication I had with them was what's in this text stream we got copies of.

Q Okay. So you've already gone through most of the text chain. So I just want to go through a little bit of the sequence of events.

Roughly, what time did you first get contacted by [REDACTED] about seeing a suspicious person?

1           A     I think it was like 5:30. Yeah, 5 --  
2     5:38 p.m. is when I sent the text, according to  
3     the...

4           Q     And that's when -- and then he called,  
5     as well?

6           A     That's -- he sent it to me. That's  
7     when I replied back in the text to call it in to  
8     command. And then when I didn't hear anything I  
9     called [REDACTED] first. He didn't answer.  
10    And then I called Commander [REDACTED] And just as he  
11    picked up the phone, that's when [REDACTED] put it over  
12    the radio finally on Ops 4.

13          Q     Got it. All right.

14                 And do you know how long that sequence  
15    took?

16          A     It was just only a few minutes.  
17    Probably two to three minutes at max.

18          Q     Okay. And you were asked questions  
19    about when you heard that there was a range finder  
20    that this person was using. That obviously gave  
21    you some concern because he wasn't playing golf.

22                 What was the -- was there a -- when you  
23    spoke to [REDACTED] when you reached him, could you  
24    hear [REDACTED] speaking to him over the radio at that  
25    point?

1           A     Yes, because as soon as he answered the  
2 phone I started to -- like, he knew who it was  
3 because obviously he had my number. And just as I  
4 started to tell him what was going on, I said,  
5 "Ed, this is" -- and then he started talking on  
6 the radio so I stopped. Because I could hear it  
7 over my radio and I could hear it over the phone  
8 and over the radio in the command center.

9           Q     Okay. And at that point after you  
10 spoke to [REDACTED] did you have further -- did you  
11 talk to anybody else about this suspicious person  
12 that [REDACTED] had responded?

13          A     I had sent a text out to, I don't  
14 remember if it went to our Signal app first or if  
15 it went to the Secret Service counter-sniper. But  
16 it was in real close proximity to it all because  
17 everybody started getting excited about it, trying  
18 to find this person.

19                But I copied the pictures in the text  
20 message that came with it and sent it to our  
21 Signal app so that our operators knew who they  
22 were looking for and to [REDACTED] the Secret  
23 Service counter-sniper, so that he had a good  
24 description of who they were looking for, as well.  
25 He replied back right away and said, "Roger that."

I'll have the guys on the AGR side focus that way or turn that way."

Q Okay. And did you -- I think it may be ten minutes later. Were you able to hear the later description of Crooks by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] when they saw him with a backpack and they saw him moving with a purpose or running in a certain direction?

Did you hear that?

A I don't remember if they put that over the radio. I think they did. I did hear that on the radio, I believe, now. But it was real brief and they just said that the person -- that they sent the pictures on or whatever -- he had a backpack now and they were trying to keep eyes on him or something. And that's all I remember about that.

Q What was your understanding as to what [REDACTED] was going to do with the information that was -- that you sent him and that [REDACTED] related to him?

A My thought was he was going to have -- since he was in the command post he would know who was available to be able to respond as uniformed officer or whoever, he would have an idea of who

1 was appointed to what positions.

2 So I assumed he would be sending in a  
3 uniformed officer that was on a patrol detail or  
4 that could break away from the event as a  
5 uniformed officer to go over and start looking for  
6 this person.

7 Q And did you hear him talking to anyone  
8 about that, like, while you were on the phone with  
9 him or was that just your understanding?

10 A No, because as soon as the radio  
11 communication come across from [REDACTED] I said,  
12 "That's all I need. I just wanted to make sure  
13 you got it." And I hung up the phone so I didn't  
14 hear anything else after that, that he would have  
15 said on his end over the radios. Because nothing  
16 came across our channel, to my knowledge,  
17 expressing anything for anybody to go investigate  
18 it further.

19 I do know our operators that were  
20 assigned to the [REDACTED] [REDACTED] [REDACTED] were on that  
21 side of the barns, on the AGR side, and they were  
22 kind of looking around. I knew they were looking.

23 So that's why I sent that picture to  
24 them, so they knew who they were looking for  
25 specifically.

1 Q Right. So you your expectation was  
2 that you send that to them, they're also going to  
3 join the search for this guy?

4 A Correct.

5 Q Before the actual shooting occurs did  
6 you talk to anyone else on your phone, not by  
7 text?

8 A I did have a Secret Service agent. I  
9 don't know who they were. I don't remember their  
10 names because it happened so fast. It was  
11 somebody I never spoke to before. They called.  
12 It was like a minute conversation, and they were  
13 asking for a physical description of this person  
14 that they were looking for and that was it.

15 So I gave them the description of the  
16 person and told them that the guys inside AGR seen  
17 him and that was all I knew of it.

18 Q Okay. So it was about a minute-long  
19 conversation?

20 A Roughly, yeah.

21 Q Okay. Did you send him the pictures  
22 that you had at that point?

23 A I did not, no.

24 Q So you were trying to describe him  
25 based on the photo that you had seen and what you

1 had heard?

2 A Correct.

3 Q And you never heard from this agent  
4 before?

5 A Correct.

6 Q Do you have any idea how he had your  
7 phone number?

8 A I believe -- I want to say I got a text  
9 message from somebody that said that somebody from  
10 Secret Service was going to be calling me. But it  
11 was, like, right, like, all in the mix of all that  
12 stuff that was going on.

13 So I think it might have -- without  
14 going back through all my texts, I think it might  
15 have been [REDACTED] that said the Secret Service is  
16 going to call me or somebody. Maybe it might have  
17 been the guys from AGR even. I don't recall  
18 exactly who it was.

19 Q So and this is -- I'm going to ask you,  
20 too, and then I'm going to turn it over to  
21 Minority.

22 You had an understanding as to what you  
23 expected to be happening with the other officers  
24 looking for this person.

25 Did you also, from the radio or your

1 phone, understand that there was, in fact, some  
2 kind of search going on?

3 A No, because I wasn't listening to the  
4 police Ops 2 or anything. I was on our chat  
5 channel only. The only thing I could do was  
6 assume that Commander [REDACTED] had had somebody from  
7 uniform go over and take a look so...

8 Q Did [REDACTED] communicate over Butler 4  
9 that he had left his post to go find this person?

10 A I don't recall if he said he left his  
11 post or anything. I believe he did say he was  
12 trying to keep eyes on him and he was moving  
13 around the building. But I didn't take that as he  
14 was -- I didn't know to what extent he was moving  
15 through that building to try to keep eyes on him.

16 Q Okay. Did [REDACTED] say anything  
17 about what he was doing to try to keep eyes on the  
18 suspect?

19 A I don't recall anything from [REDACTED]  
20 no.

21 Q What was the level of concern then that  
22 you could discern, right, from hearing what [REDACTED]  
23 and [REDACTED] were saying, particularly [REDACTED]

24 A It was a concern. It was more of a  
25 rush to try to find this guy to intervene with him

1 because we didn't know what his intentions were,  
2 obviously. So you could tell there was an urgency  
3 to try to find this guy to question him. But our  
4 hands were kind of tied on it, so we were kind of,  
5 like, listening and just trying to hope that  
6 somebody found him quick enough and make contact  
7 with this person or something.

8 So our extent of it was, we got the  
9 information out and then we were kind of like in  
10 radio silence just waiting for somebody to say,  
11 "Hey, we got this guy." And we never heard it.

12 Q Right. You anticipated my next  
13 question.

14 So did you -- at that point, you were  
15 waiting to hear, "We got this person" or is it at  
16 that point that you heard the shots ring out?

17 A No, because that was all -- I'm trying  
18 to remember the timeline on that exactly. But  
19 that was -- it all kind of took place before Trump  
20 really started getting into his speech even --  
21 like I don't remember -- I don't believe it was  
22 before he got on stage, but it was right about  
23 that time he got up there and they were really  
24 actively looking for this guy.

25 And then it was the radio communication

as we were -- I was still on binoculars watching the crowd. And like I said, that's when I seen the horse with the lady on it. And I heard across any radio Commander [REDACTED] make a statement, "There's a guy on the roof at AGR with a riffle. [REDACTED] respond now." And, like, went into shock factor, like, "Oh, that might be our guy."

And before I could even set the binoculars down and get out my rifle, the shots rang out and it was over. And by the time the last shot rang out I was scanning the rooftop and couldn't see anybody at AGR at that point.

Q Okay. So you heard from [REDACTED] over --

A Ops 4.

Q Ops 4 that he had been identified. He had a rifle? He was on the roof?

A Correct. And from what I understand he was relaying that information he heard on the police channels that --

For the patrol vehicles as he was at the command post. So as he heard it, he relayed it over our channel, so we all -- we were all aware of it, as well, so...

Q And do you know -- did you know at the time whether or not the Secret Service had

1 actually picked up their radios before?

2 A I did not know that, no.

3 Q You believe they would have because  
4 they were left for them?

5 A I believed they did because I told them  
6 where the radios were and it was in close  
7 proximity to them. And they said, "Yeah, no  
8 problem." And I said, "If you don't get them.  
9 Call me or text me and I will make sure you have a  
10 radio." And I never heard back from them so I had  
11 to assume that they did stop there and get them.

12 It wasn't until after the event that I  
13 found out that they never stopped.

14 [REDACTED] Okay. I will turn it over  
15 to Minority.

16 [REDACTED]: We can go off the record  
17 for a minute.

18 (Brief recess from 3:35 p.m. - 3:37 p.m.)

19 EXAMINATION

20 BY [REDACTED]

21 Q Again, just a few sort of clarification  
22 points and to pick up on what you've been covering  
23 with our Majority colleagues:

24 We spoke about, generally, Secret  
25 Service counter-snipers being positioned on top of

1 the barn.

2 Is it correct that there are two barns  
3 that they were positioned on behind the stage or  
4 are they both on one barn top?

5 A It was two barns that were kind of  
6 connected with, like, a pass-through underneath  
7 it. So technically it was you separate barn  
8 roofs, yes.

9 Q And was there one agent on each of  
10 those barn roofs?

11 A There was two counter-snipers on each  
12 roof. So there was four total from them.

13 Q Do you know as between the two which  
14 [REDACTED] was on?

15 A If you're looking at the stage with the  
16 barns behind it, he would have been the one to the  
17 right.

18 Q And we've spoken about your  
19 communications with him at a few different points.  
20 After you received the photo from [REDACTED] around  
21 5:38 p.m. you said that you passed that message on  
22 to [REDACTED] by text message, as well. You  
23 took the screenshot and forwarded it to him.

24 I believe you said he said something  
25 along the lines of "Roger that." And that he

1 would have his guys turn that way.

2 What does that mean?

3 A Correct. He said, "Roger that. I will  
4 have the guys on the AGR side" -- I can't remember  
5 if he said look that way or turn that way. But he  
6 relayed to them to take their focus and make sure  
7 it was on AGR, which is what they did.

8 I physically watched them pick their  
9 tripod up with the rifle on it and turn it towards  
10 AGR side and started covering AGR with it.

11 Q And that was not the side that  
12 [REDACTED] was on? He was on the right side so  
13 the AGR side would be the left side barns?

14 A Correct.

15 Q You said you saw them move, so I  
16 don't -- I understand you to say, you didn't --  
17 you weren't part of that communication with Secret  
18 Service but given that you saw them move --

19 A I knew that --

20 Q -- you took it that he had given them  
21 that instruction?

22 A Correct.

23 Q After that communication with  
24 [REDACTED] did you have any other  
25 communications with him?

1           A     I sent him a text that night and I  
2     said, "Sorry shit went sideways. I hope you guys  
3     are all good." And I never heard anything back,  
4     which I didn't expect to. But it was just one of  
5     those -- like, because right after that happened  
6     it was like, "Oh, man, you know." So nobody was  
7     expecting that.

8           Q     Understood. But nothing between that  
9     movement prior to the shooting and the time of the  
10    shooting?

11          A     No.

12          Q     Thank you.

13                I just want to clarify that the first  
14    time you heard or learned about that there was a  
15    suspicious person who we now know to be Mr. Crooks  
16    was this text from [REDACTED] the photos at 5:38?

17          A     Repeat the question. Sorry.

18          Q     Bad question.

19                Was 5:38 p.m. text messages with the  
20    photos from [REDACTED] was that the first time you  
21    became aware of Mr. Crooks?

22          A     Yeah, and there was some -- I think  
23    there was some chatter about somebody that they  
24    were watching, but it wasn't anything that they  
25    put out, as far as a concern yet.

1                   And then it was, when they got the  
2                   pictures of him and that he was using the range  
3                   finder a little bit ago before that. Now he's  
4                   over here doing this and he's kind of getting more  
5                   and more suspicious. That's when they put the  
6                   pictures out and that's when we relayed the  
7                   information then.

8                   Q       What do you recall about those earlier  
9                   transmissions about a potentially suspicious  
10                  person?

11                  A       Just that they were talking about this  
12                  guy walking around with a range finder and stuff.  
13                  They said he was wearing a gray shirt and shorts  
14                  and that was about it. And then he finally got  
15                  pictures to send out of, "Hey, this is the guy  
16                  we're looking at."

17                       And I think that's when they noticed  
18                  there was a concern that there was so many people  
19                  over there that they couldn't pinpoint this guy  
20                  specifically.

21                  Q       And what was the particular concern  
22                  about Mr. Crooks?

23                  A       Just his mannerisms. He wasn't -- he  
24                  wasn't with anybody else. He wasn't associating  
25                  with anybody else, as far as, like, he didn't show

1       that he was in a group of people.

2               The fact that he had a backpack with  
3       him. The fact he was walking around up and down  
4       the fence line supposedly with a range finder. It  
5       just kind of stood out that the guy is -- that  
6       something is not right with this specific person  
7       we need to get this guy checked out and see what's  
8       going on with him.

9               Q       Do you recall approximately what time  
10       that chatter began?

11              A       I don't know. I just know it was  
12       shortly before the text messages come out.

13              Q       Thank you.

14               From your vantage point could you see  
15       anybody -- any law enforcement activating around  
16       the AGR site to look for Mr. crooks?

17              A       No. Because the curvature and the  
18       landscape between us, I didn't even know that  
19       there was people on that property up along that  
20       fence line until after the fact.

21              Q       So from your view looking out towards  
22       AGR you could not see the area between the fence  
23       line and that green space between the fence line  
24       and the building.

25               What could you see on AGR?

1           A     I could see the building that Crooks  
2 ended up on top of. I could see the ductwork that  
3 come up but I couldn't see the base work of it.

4                     So probably the last four or five feet  
5 above that knoll to the peak of the roof  
6 (indicating).

7           Q     When you heard or when you received  
8 this text message from [REDACTED] you become aware  
9 of what this gentleman looks like, that he's  
10 around AGR, are you looking for him from your  
11 vantage point?

12          A     No, because I couldn't see anybody on  
13 the ground at that point. Anybody that was on the  
14 ground at AGR was over the crest of the hill and I  
15 couldn't even see their heads.

16                     So there was nobody I could really look  
17 for on that side from my perspective.

18          Q     So what are you doing? What are you  
19 looking at at this point?

20          A     I'm still watching the crowd at this  
21 point. I'm watching as far as I can see over  
22 there. I'm trying to watch along -- because there  
23 was two fence lines. There was one that was --  
24 there was like a space in between.

25                     So there was the event, there was a

1 fence and then there was a property borderline  
2 fence (indicating) so there was a space in between  
3 that was all grass, too.

4 And actually when I seen the lady on  
5 the horse that's where I thought she was at, was  
6 in that grassy area in between the two fences. I  
7 didn't realize she was actually over at AGR.  
8 Because like I said, all could see was her  
9 shoulders and up with the flag and she was on  
10 horseback so...

11 Q And you've mentioned this woman a few  
12 times. When did that occur, approximately?

13 A Maybe a minute before I got the text  
14 message about the pictures and then the  
15 announcement that somebody was up on the roof.  
16 I'm sorry. Let me back up.

17 It was moments before the shots rang  
18 out that I seen her.

19 Q So you received the photos of Mr. -- or  
20 from [REDACTED] around 5:38. You're scanning the  
21 crowd. At some point probably after 6; is that  
22 fair?

23 A Yes.

24 Q You see this woman on horseback?

25 A Correct.

1 Q As you're looking in that direction at  
2 any point does Mr. Crooks come into your line of  
3 sight?

4 A No. No. I never saw him.

5 Q After the shooting were you able to see  
6 Mr. Crooks?

7 A No.

8 Q Did you ever consider leaving your post  
9 to help with the search? Would that have been  
10 appropriate?

11 A No. That would have left my post  
12 abandoned and then we would have lost coverage on  
13 that, as well. We did have our -- we call it our  
14 kit, our ballistic gear with us just in case  
15 something did go sideways like this. And we were  
16 expecting more of an inside-the-event type thing.

17 So we had our ballistic gear with us  
18 that if need be, they could pull two of us from  
19 that grandstand to act as a two-person [REDACTED]  
20 [REDACTED] or a counterassault team to go  
21 engage something.

22 But it was strictly, like, last second,  
23 like, we need more people than what we have type  
24 thing. Up until that there was no intention of  
25 ever leaving our post.

1                   In fact, we never left the grandstand  
2                   until 8:00 that night even.

3                   Q       So even after the shooting you remained  
4                   stationed at the grandstand?

5                   A       Correct, because there was concerns of  
6                   a water tower of possibly something being up there  
7                   or a person being up there. So we were watching  
8                   the water tower for several minutes waiting for  
9                   them to get a drone up to be able to search the  
10                  top of the tower and stuff.

11                  Q       And around what time was that that you  
12                  heard that there might be a concern about the  
13                  water tower?

14                  A       That was -- I want to say that was  
15                  after 6:30-ish sometime. Because it was after our  
16                  guys were already on the roof with AGR with  
17                  Mr. Crooks then. So it was after that at some point.

18                  Q       Could you see the water tower from your  
19                  vantage point?

20                  A       Yes. It was 510 yards away.

21                  Q       I'm asking the question because I know  
22                  that there's, as you said, some hills there and  
23                  some trees. So I just wanted to make sure.

24                  A       Yes.

25                  Q       And at any point did you see anything

1 suspicious around the water tower?

2 A No.

3 Q And you just mentioned drone. I don't  
4 recall if we covered this earlier. At any point  
5 in the day did you see drones flying around the  
6 event?

7 A No. And that surprised me when I heard  
8 reports that after the fact that he had flown one.  
9 And I was, like, I never heard it, never seen it.  
10 But they had the music so loud that -- normally  
11 you hear a drone. It can make that buzzing noise.  
12 But the music was so loud that I couldn't hear  
13 anything but the music a lot of times so...

14 [REDACTED] Thank you. I think my  
15 colleague has a few follow-up questions, as well.

16 [REDACTED] Okay.

17 EXAMINATION

18 BY [REDACTED]

19 Q For clarification, the timeframe in  
20 which you saw the woman on horseback, was that  
21 moments before the actual event started?

22 A That was before the actual shooting  
23 started from Crooks.

24 Q Okay. The woman on horseback --

25 A So the even -- I'm sorry. Go ahead.

1 Q Please. Go for it.

2 A The event had already started. Trump  
3 was already on stage and she was riding back and  
4 forth at that point.

5 Q Thank you.

6 A Which I thought she was running or  
7 walking or something but...

8 Q On July -- the morning of July 13th,  
9 you had the Butler ESU briefing. And then after  
10 the briefing you had a separate meeting with all  
11 of the snipers, the local snipers, correct?

12 A Just inside that briefing building,  
13 yeah. It was just a couple minutes. Like as soon  
14 as we finished, we kind of broke off into our  
15 respective groups and just discussed a quick game  
16 plan of -- that's when I got everybody's cell  
17 phone numbers and said, "Hey, we're going to have  
18 a small text group just for non-emergency stuff."  
19 And just kind of made sure everybody knew who was  
20 who and where they were going.

21 Q And during that meeting did any  
22 information about counter-snipers come up?

23 A No.

24 Q You didn't talk at all about this was  
25 the first time that counter-snipers were going to

1 be at an event like this?

2 A No, I didn't hear about that until  
3 later on. The guys started expressing concern  
4 after the fact. They were kind of concerned about  
5 that. But I didn't hear anything prior to that.

6 Q And at no time did the Secret Service  
7 give any sort of an intelligence briefing to any  
8 local or state --

9 A No.

10 Q -- police?

11 In the planning did anyone on the  
12 sniper team consider the water tower or cell phone  
13 towers around the event area?

14 A We did. We considered the cell phone  
15 towers. The problem with them were they were in  
16 the middle of the event, so they were going to be  
17 completely surrounded by the event crowd. And  
18 they were only about ten feet off the ground, the  
19 base of them. And we figured with the amount of  
20 cell phone activity that was going to be going on,  
21 we'd probably all have cancer by the time we left  
22 there. So we kind of avoided that position.

23 The water tower was, more or less, out  
24 of play to us, mainly because it's owned by PA  
25 American Water. And with the lack of time to

1 prepare we didn't have good contacts for them to  
2 get in touch and say, "Hey, we want to put a  
3 sniper up there."

4 We looked at it physically from the  
5 ground and said that the walkway around that tower  
6 is pretty narrow. To put somebody up there for  
7 overwatch is going to be pretty difficult,  
8 especially with the gear we take. And the fact  
9 that we couldn't just gain access to it because  
10 the fence is like ten feet high with Barbed wire  
11 and locked shut.

12 And then the ladder that goes up to it,  
13 you would need like a 20-foot extension ladder  
14 practically to get to the bottom of the ladder  
15 that it's attached to the water tower to get the  
16 rest of the way to the top.

17 Also, with the position of it, we felt  
18 that the trees would impede our view of the crowd  
19 itself.

20 So, again, if it would have been -- if  
21 your job is counter-sniper, we may have pursued  
22 that a little bit more, but being our job was  
23 determined to be overwatch we didn't feel that was  
24 a good vantage point just for overwatch of the  
25 crowd.

1           Q     And did, at any point, did the US  
2     Secrete Service approve the sniper locations that  
3     Butler ESU came up with?

4           A     They never physically or verbally said  
5     those are great positions or bad positions. But  
6     they had us marked in their -- the Secret Service  
7     counter-snipers documents, the packets that they  
8     gave us, they had the specific windows marked of  
9     where we were going to be and they never once  
10    questioned why were you in those windows.

11                    So we had to assume that they were okay  
12    with it, too, if they didn't question or state any  
13    concerns with it.

14           Q     Can you explain what you meant about  
15    tactical gear being a higher level of force?

16           A     Yeah. When you're in a police uniform  
17    that's like the lowest level of force. It's a  
18    show of force. So a uniformed officer going up  
19    and addressing somebody that's on somebody's  
20    property, that's a proper level of force.

21                    Me rolling in with a ballistic helmet,  
22    ballistic gear, AR strapped across my chest,  
23    that's a way higher level of force for somebody  
24    that's just on the property that shouldn't be  
25    there.

So that's why our concern was hey, we need to get a uniformed person over here because the big topic, obviously, is excessive use of force. And that is excessive use of force if you show up with four guys in ARs and tactical gear just to say get off the property. So we had to weigh our options with that.

And at that point since there was no weapon seen, obviously until the last second, it was, this guy is just a person of interest and we just need to investigate him and see what his intents are.

So to raise it to that level of going in in ballistic gear wasn't warranted yet. Had he been seen with a weapon, obviously we would have engaged at that point then.

Q Okay. And now [REDACTED] was there and he was helping with all of the preplanning. From conversations that you had once you found out about the event, where was he planning on being with Butler ESU?

A He got stuck in uniform at the back entrance to the Farm Show grounds where former President Trump entered at with the motorcade. So he was actually in uniform working for Butler

1 Township at that point.

2 Q Now, when was that decision made?

3 A That was made by his boss through  
4 Butler Township. I don't know -- I believe it was  
5 determined earlier in the week so we knew he  
6 wasn't going to be one of the snipers assisting  
7 us. But he was able to attend the meetings  
8 because he was off those days where I wasn't.

9 Q Okay. So there was no plan for him to  
10 be at the AGR Building until the evening of the  
11 12th and then that plan changed where he was in  
12 uniform.

13 The plan was always for him to be in  
14 uniform and he was just helping with the planning?

15 A To my knowledge, yes. Yeah, I don't  
16 know officially when he found out but I knew he  
17 knew a couple days beforehand.

18 Q Thank you for that clarification.

19 And then finally, you mentioned that  
20 you saw the Secret Service counter-snipers  
21 actually move their tripods towards the AGR  
22 Building.

23 Approximately what time was that at?

24 A That was shortly after I text him. And  
25 I believe I text the counter-sniper at 5:42 p.m.,

1 I think, was on my text messages. So right about  
2 that time. So at the latest a quarter to 6.

3 Q And at any point did you see them move  
4 their tripods away from the AGR?

5 A No. To my knowledge, they stayed on  
6 that -- everything I seen from that point on, even  
7 pictures of the event that come out from the crowd  
8 that they were still facing that direction.

9 Q So from approximately 5:42 p.m. United  
10 States Secret Service, to your knowledge, was  
11 faced towards the AGR Building?

12 A Correct.

13 [REDACTED] Thank you. That's all  
14 of my questions.

15 [REDACTED] My colleague, [REDACTED], is  
16 going to have a few questions.

17 EXAMINATION

18 BY [REDACTED]:

19 Q Just a clarification. A ballistic kit,  
20 can you describe what that means.

21 A It's a vest that has steel plates in it  
22 that are rifle rated so they can take rifle  
23 rounds. So it's basically a, what you would see a  
24 military person wearing. They have the vest that  
25 has their magazine pouches on the front. They got

the protective shoulder pieces, the protective neck pieces, the groin protector on it.

So it's something that you see with any tactical team doing any kind of risky entry or military combat.

Q So when you say "uniform," you're talking about something different than --

A Correct. I'm talking about an actual police officer in uniform, kind of like [REDACTED] was today when he come in. That would be a normal police uniform. So if I say police uniformed officer, that's what I would expect.

Q When you mentioned a drone being used, do you know who flew that drone?

A There's a private company out of Evans City that assists us with stuff and I believe they were on site. I don't know when they got there. And they had made contact with them since they were there or in the area and asked if they could just put a drone up real quick to check that tower out.

Because at that point we had contacted -- or our commanders had contacted the PA American Water and they said basically, "Hey, breach the door or breach the gate get into the

1 water tower to gain access if you have to. But  
2 our response person is about an hour away." So we  
3 figured rather than cause damage to his gate and  
4 stuff, the guy offered his drone and we just let  
5 him put the drone up instead. Because then we  
6 would have had somebody climb 200 feet in the air  
7 on a ladder to go check out so...

8 Q Right. So the drone is operated by  
9 this, you said, by a private company?

10 A Yeah, it's a private person. I don't  
11 know who.

12 Q Contracted by Butler ESU?

13 A Well, they're not necessarily  
14 contracted. They just volunteer their services  
15 with us. So they contact us if we're having a  
16 search or something and ask if they want them to  
17 assist. And a lot of times we'll let them assist  
18 because they have a lot of different drone  
19 technology that we don't have.

20 Q Right. Right. Kind of a personnel  
21 question: Do you have any awareness of DHA, HSI  
22 folks there on July 13th?

23 A I didn't -- I personally didn't know  
24 who was DHS or Secret Service at all. Like I  
25 didn't know until after the fact that there was

1       only a handful of Secret Service agents there. I  
2       just assumed everybody was a Secret Service. So  
3       it was afterwards that I found out that the  
4       security was being done by the Department of  
5       Homeland Security and stuff like that.

6                So I didn't know who was doing what  
7       jobs there.

8                Q       One other question I had. You say a  
9       packet. Was that a packet only information that's  
10      for the folks doing sniper duties or was that,  
11      like, a comprehensive packet for everything?

12              A       That was just a packet for the  
13      counter-snipers and what their duties were from  
14      the Secret Service counter-snipers. It basically  
15      gave me a view of what their view was, a  
16      180-degree view around their area, of their  
17      positions. And an overview of the ground itself,  
18      of the 400-yard perimeter circle drawn on it  
19      (indicating).

20              Q       Right. So you didn't get any kind of  
21      overall comprehensive, sort of, document from  
22      Secret Service then just specific to these duties?

23              A       No, nothing about the duties itself.  
24      Just about what their area of responsibility was  
25      as far as their views and stuff. That was it.

Q Right. Okay. Great. Thank you.

I just want to thank you very much for coming in. I really appreciate your time today and, of course, your service. And we know it's not easy to relive the events of that day and the lead up to that day. And we just very much appreciate it on behalf of the members and, you know, if we have any further questions that we need, we'll go to your lawyer first.

But hopefully we won't need to talk to you again, at least on this end.

I'm used to talking every week now it seems like, so I'm good.

: Thank you so much, sir.

No problem.

(Witness excused.)
